SHEEP AS WEED DESTROYERS

Common Practice in Some Sections to Turn Lambs into Cornfields to Clean Up Rows.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Sheep are extremely valuable as weed destroyers, and they can be shifted from field to field as crops permit, where they will clean up the fence rows.

In some parts of the country it is common practice to turn the lambs, at weaning time, into the cornfields, where they destroy weeds, but do not injure the corn. Where the corn ears stand up fairly high, sheep may be turned in after corn is laid by. They may eat an occasional ear that

is down and they will trim up the lower blades of the corn, but they will not "ride" the stalks down as hogs do. The benefit which they thus render is much greater than the damage they do.

Woven wire fence is convenient for confining sheep to specified areas, especially when this area is in corn, since the cornstalks serve very well as posts to which to tie the wire netting. Corner posts should, of course, be more substantial.

Sheep may be used also to destroy weeds in fields that are not planted in crops, along roadways, and in waste places, thus tending to clean up the whole place and reduce the weed seeds that may be blown in or tracked in on cultivated fields. On the ordinary farm sheep are better than goats for this purpose, since they are more easily confined.

ADVANTAGES OF FARM MULE

Will Take Better Care of Himself Than Horse—Also Less Subject to Digestive Disorders.

The mule has certain decided advantages as a work animal. For the man who does not know how or is unwilling to give his horse a reasonable amount of care, the mule is the better animal, because he will take better care of himself than will the horse.

The mule is naturally more able to stand hot weather than is the horse. He will slow down when the work becomes hard and the weather hot, whereas a horse will begin to fret, and thus will be even more likely to become overheated. Hence, a mule is safer in the hands of a careless or incompetent driver.

The mule requires less grain and will readily consume more roughage than will a workhorse doing the same amount of work. The mule is less subject to digestive disorders.

Another important consideration is that a mule does not depreciate in value so much from age and hard usage as does a horse.

PROTECT CATTLE IN WINTER

Beef Steers Should Be Kept in Dry Lot and Provided With Windbreak of Some Kind.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

During the winter beef steers should be kept in a dry lot and provided with a windbreak from the north or given free access to an open shed. In some sections of the South weather conditions alone may not justify open sheds, but when the saving of feed and manure and the protection of pastures from tramping in wet weather are considered such sheds will prove to be profitable investments. Breeding animals may require even more protection during severe weather than an open shed would provide.

CONVENIENT FOOD FOR HOGS

Give as Near Balanced Ration as Possible—Alfalfa Hay Will Add Comfort to Raws.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

If the hog is to be comfortable and profitable you must provide food "convenient" for him; convenient not in the sense of handy, although that is desirable, but "suitable," as nearly as possible a balanced ration. You will add to the comfort of the brood sows that you are keeping over winter if you will give them plenty of alfalfa hay, which they can take out of the rack as sheep would.

HOME BUILDING TO BE POPULAR NOW

Plans Can Be Revived as Restrictions Are Removed.

MUCH ROOM IN THIS HOUSE

Good Design for Use Either in City or Small Town Where Narrow Lot Is to Be Used by the Builder.

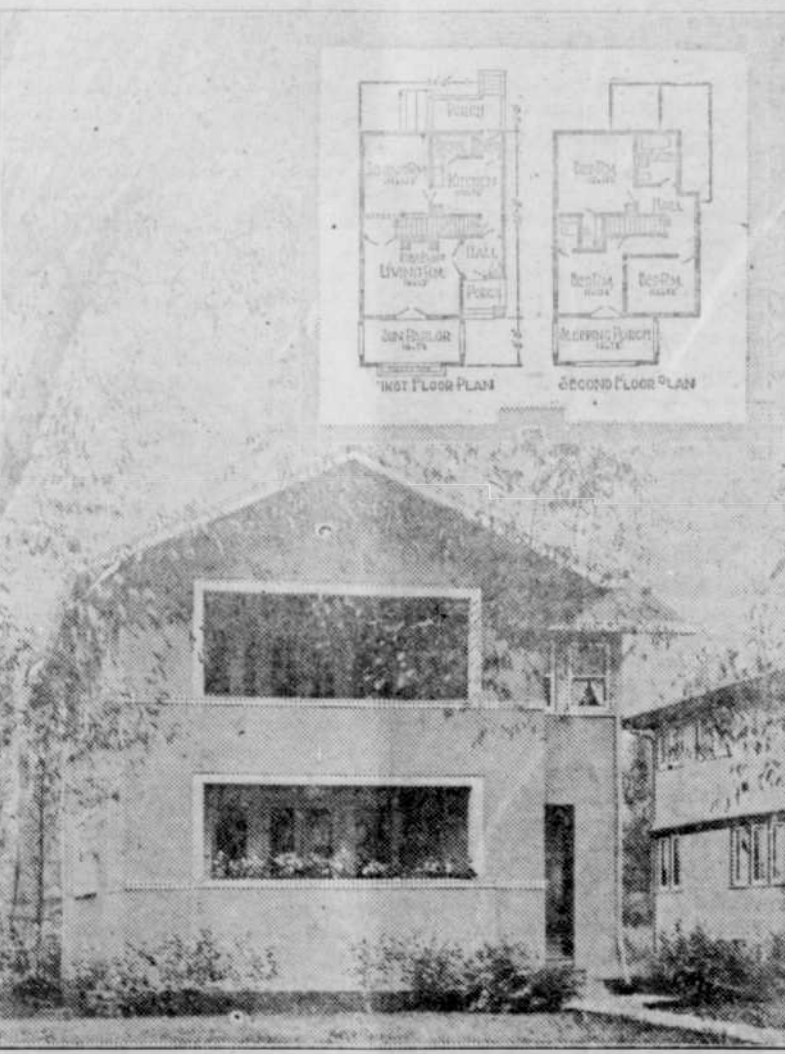

Finding a home has been an arduous job in many cities and towns during the last two years. While the demands of industry have drawn many workers from the rural communities, the restrictions on building made necessary by the war have kept the builders from providing the homes that the demand ordinarily would produce.

Now, however, the restrictions have been removed and building can go on. This building of homes is being fostered by the United States government, which, through William B. Wilson, secretary of the U. S. department of labor, is urging the necessity of building to provide work for those of the building trades who have been released from military duty.

During the next few weeks there will be an active "build a building" campaign, which is expected to greatly stimulate the construction of homes. The thoughts of thousands of those who long have desired to have a home of their own will be turned to the subject of building. And as these thoughts take form, the prospective builders will be studying plans for their home.

For the Small Lot. Herewith is shown a modern design for a home in town or city where space is more limited than in the country. This house of stucco is 24 feet



a width and 39½ feet long, not including the rear porch projection. It is a typical modern city design. Liberal use is made of double doors, full glazed, between the several rooms, while the stairs, partly open to the dining room, make an interesting detail. Six good rooms with bath are provided.

There are three good sized rooms: beside the sun parlor and a spacious hall on the first floor. The living room is 13 by 16 feet and is connected with the hall on the side and the sun parlor at the front by double doors, thus making it more extensive, especially in summer when the doors to the sun parlor will be left open. A fireplace and windows, which occupy most of the outside wall space, are attractive features of the room.

The stairway is open both to the living room and dining room. The latter is 11 by 13½ feet.

Opposite is the kitchen, 9½ by 11½ feet. There is a good sized pantry, while a door leads to a rear porch.

Three Bed Rooms. The second floor contains three bed rooms, the bath room and a sleeping porch, which is over the sun parlor. The sleeping porch is 7½ by 18 feet, the same as the sun parlor. Along the front of the second floor are two bed rooms, each opening into the hall, while at the rear is the third bed room, with the bath adjoining.

From this description it will be seen that the house is an attractive one on the interior. All of the rooms are so

connected that there is not the necessity of going "around" one to get to another.

The exterior view shown gives an idea of how attractive it may be made on the outside, considering that it is planned for a small city lot. The long space in the sun parlor for window boxes, the expanse along the front for shrubs and the stretch of lawn all make it attractive.

To those who are the owners of small lots in cities and towns, or who are about to buy a building lot and do not want to put into it the considerable sum that is necessary where real estate is expensive, this design will have a strong appeal.

The more the plan is studied the more it will be seen that here is economy of space, coupled with an attractive and convenient home.

Small Homes Get Attention. Some of the best architects in the country now are giving more and more attention to the planning of small homes. Because of this fact, the designs made nowadays embody some excellent features. It should be remembered when planning to build that the small sum required as a fee to an architect is money well spent, in that it saves costly mistakes and assures the best that can be secured for the money expended.

REGULATING NECESSARY

During the rush of spring work milkings in the morning will be done on time but at night the danger is in leaving this work for the women folks to do or until after dark. PROBLEMS IN WINTER FEEDS

For Economical Production Wage-Earning Cow Should Be Fed Its Full Capacity.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The problems involved in winter feeding are usually distinctly different from those of summer feeding. Pasture (or green feed), usually the basis of summer feeding, is not available. Broadly speaking, there are two factors involved in this problem, first, to satisfy the needs of the cow and, second, to suit the pocketbook. The cow must have an ample supply of feed of a palatable nature, and this feed must be supplied at a price which will permit a profit on the feeding operation.

In general farm practice it is advisable, so far as it is economical, to use the feeds produced on the farm. Often the freight rates and the middle-

men's charges, if saved, will constitute a good profit for the feeder. This is especially true of roughages. Such feeds are bulky and in most cases must be hauled at a considerable cost; the freight rates also are much greater in proportion to the nutrients contained than on the grains.

When land is high in price and the markets for dairy products are good, it is often impracticable to grow all the feeds on the farm. In such cases arrangements first should be made to grow the roughage, on account of the high cost of transporting these feeds. In most cases the prime object of the farm under such conditions will be to supply the greatest possible quantity of roughage.

It is a difficult problem to provide a system of winter feeding of roughage which will make the best use of home-grown roughage and at the same time insure full production.

In addition to containing the proper nutrients in the right proportion, part of the ration should be of a succulent nature. It is extremely difficult, if not impossible, to keep cows in full production throughout the winter without some succulent feed. There are two chief sources of succulent feed for winter feeding—silage and roots. Of these, silage is in almost universal use by commercial dairymen. While almost any green crop may be used for silage, the heavy yields of corn, as compared with other crops, and its comparative ease of handling, together with its keeping qualities, make it the leading silage crop. Where the cost of land and the prices of dairy products are high, and the system of farming of necessity is intensive, it is questionable whether the dairyman should consider any other silage crop.

ROOTS FOR FEEDING CATTLE

Chief Function Is to Supply Succulence—Have Special Application for Cows Only.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The chief function of roots in cattle feeding is to supply a succulent feed. Under general farm conditions the quantity of nutrients grown per acre in root crops is small in comparison to the cost of production. These root crops, however, can be preserved during the winter equally well whether large or small quantities are fed each day, and therefore have special application when only a few cows are to be fed. Of the different root crops mangel wurzels furnish the greatest yield per acre. Other kinds of beets and turnips and carrots may be used. Turnips, however, should be fed after milking rather than before, as they cause a bad flavor in the products if fed immediately before milking.
