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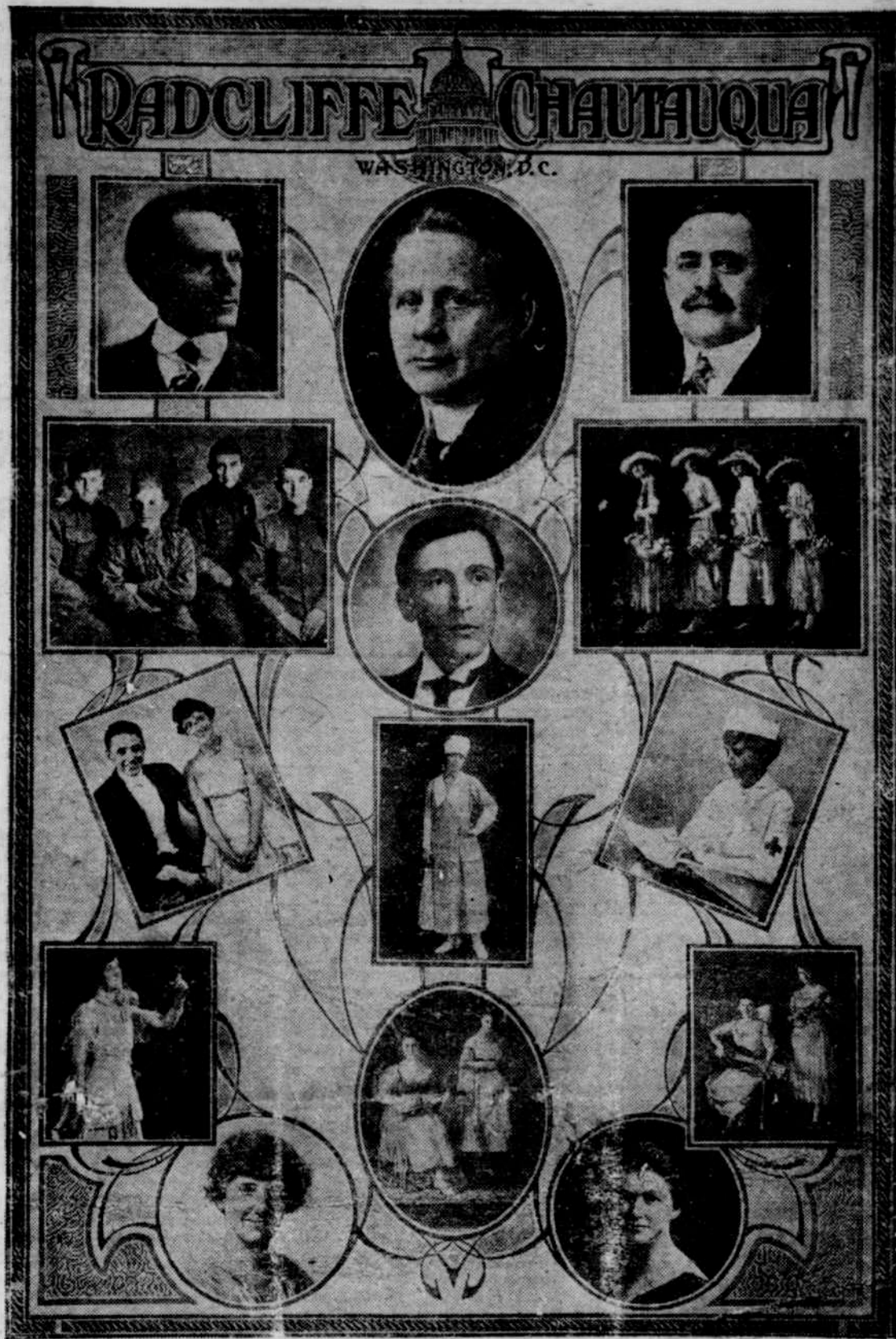

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THREE BIG EDUCATIONAL DAYS IN NYSSA



Chautauqua Attractions In Nyssa June 23, 24, 25

The Nyssa Chautauqua association met in the city council room Monday evening and elected its officer and committee men for the work to be done in preparing for the opening of our Chautauqua to be held in Nyssa. The dates for Nyssa's three-day inspirational community meet are June 23, 24 and 25.

Cooperating with the Radcliffe Chautauqua System, the local organizers of this annual getting-together are arranging for a rousing time with twelve gripping events on the program. Entertainment numbers of the first quality are to be combined with features illustrative of the great central theme of this year's program—Education for every American child.

The quickened spirit of democracy embracing Education as the only road to future progress. Embarking on a crusade for real education and staking its success on the finer and more joyous things of life, the Radcliffe Chautauqua, and its local co-operators invite the whole community to make the town the dynamic center of the United States for three days.

The local Chautauqua promoters are building for an ideal—a raised standard of living for everybody. And they are building with ideas. The program is loaded with material.

THE FIGHTING YANKS, a group of military boys in the uniforms they wore in France, will make the Chautauqua atmosphere, vibrate with the speed of their rapid-fire entertainment on the afternoon and night of the first day. This organization of instrumentalists, vocalists and dramatic entertainers will give the opening program its humorous and its rollicking touch with their colorful "trench" repertory.

THE COLUMBIANS, rollicking youthful spirits, all of them, but artists of the highest order, will offer two concerts on the second day. These are skilled instrumentalists as well as highly trained vocalists, and their esthetic musical numbers are offered in combination with colorful costume effects.

THE BELLINO TAYLOR CO. has been reserved as the concert offering of the closing day and the assurance is given that its offering will be of the first quality in artistic effect. Sam Bellino, the Accordion King, will bring with him his big instrument with the pipe-organ tone and will demonstrate not only its complex technique and its dignity as a musical instrument, but also his mastery of it in both lighter and symphonic effects. Lloyd Taylor will contribute a group of readings and impersonations to the concert program. Mr. Taylor is a rapid fire artist, a dramatic dynamo.

The six lectures are not less entertaining, witty snappy and radiant, one is assured, but they have a very serious purpose. The big, throbbing question of the hour is Education. The Chautauqua orators and demonstrators will make this subject ring.

Dr. W. T. S. Culp, broad, eloquent, keen, analytical, constructive, the master of 5,000 audiences, will give the opening afternoon lecture on "THE LAMP OF ALADDIN." This lecture will be remembered long after the khaki tent has departed. There will be stimulate brains and around emotion before he has finished with his graphic picture of the achievements of the trained minds of the world. His evening subject, "THE GREATEST THING THAT MEN MAY KNOW," will promote ideals of true education, not of the hands alone, nor yet of the head only, but also of the heart.

The marshal of this educational crusade will be the Chautauqua Director, Dr. A. M. Hyde, who, on the night of the second day, will carry the central theme to a practical level under the topic "THE PROBLEM OF THE UNPREPARED." The Director will inject fresh elements into social life and, in snappy, live wire phrases, awaken us to the backward conditions of American life. His third night topic will be "PUSHING BACK THE HORIZON—Individual, Home, Community," a fertile subject that invites eloquence and imagery but that affords also a valuable basis for objective instruction in ideals.

Of particular significance will be the lecture on "HOME MAKING" and the conference on "THE HOUSE AROUND THE CORNER" by the Radcliffe Woman Specialist in Home-Engineering, on the afternoon of the second day. That she will be listened to with absorbing interest by both men and women is the

SENATE WANTS TEXT OF PEACE TREATY

Bankers Called on to Explain How Treaty Was Brought Into United States.

Washington. — Resolutions asking the state department for the text of the treaty with Germany and directing the foreign relations committee to investigate how copies of the unpublished documents have reached private hands in New York, were adopted by the senate without a roll call.

The request for the treaty will be referred by state department officials to President Wilson and Secretary Lansing at Paris and pending a reply no official opinion is available here as to whether the text will be forthcoming.

Under the investigation resolution introduced at the request of the white house by Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, senior democrat of the foreign relations committee, it is expected that a far-reaching inquiry will begin within a few days. The committee met Monday to formulate plans which may include the summoning of members of the American peace delegation. Adoption of the Hitchcock resolution

BIG PLOT TO STEAL MILLIONS ALLEGED

High Officers Involved in Attempted Rakeoff on \$30,000,000 Sales.

Detroit. — With the arrest here of four men, one of them an army officer, department of justice agents disclosed an alleged conspiracy to defraud the government in the sale of \$30,000,000 worth of army supplies to be salvaged here.

The United States grand jury has returned indictments, it was announced, against Captain Soterios Nicholson of Washington, chief finance officer of the ordnance department, for this district; an unnamed army officer recently sent to France in connection with the disposal of excess supplies; Grant Hugh Browne, a millionaire sportsman and racetrack owner of Detroit, and Fred C. Collins, vice-consul for Greece and president of a local realty company.

All but the officer in France, together with Bert Harris, a junk dealer of New York, are held at Fort Wayne, an army post here, for trial. According to Arthur L. Barkey, chief of the bureau of investigation here, Collins, Browne and Harris are charged with conspiracy to eliminate other bidders for the material, the bids being held so low that the highest of the three would be far below the value of the supplies disposed of.
