Senate Wants Text Of Peace Treaty

tion came after the debate had reached a dramatic climax in a clash between Mr. Hitchcock and Chairman Lodge of the foreign relations committee. After this clash a request by Mr. Lodge that the senate substitute an investigation resolution drawn by Senator Kellogg, republican of Minnesota, was withdrawn and the question was put on adoption. In its investigation of how copies of the peace treaty reached New York, the senate foreign relations committee subpoenaed Jacob Schiff, Thomas F. Lamont, H. P. Davison, Paul Warburg, J. P. Morgan and Frank A. Vanderlip. Lamont was requested to bring with him any correspondence which passed between J. P. Morgan & Co. and its Paris and London agents regarding the treaty, and particularly any communications on the subject between the banking house and Davison, while the latter was abroad. The committee also adopted unanimously a motion by Senator Fall, republican, of New Mexico, inviting Acting Secretary Polk to appear as a witness and to take part in the inquiry by cross examining witnesses and otherwise.

President Wilson, in a cablegram received by Senator Hitchcock, democrat, Nebraska, said he hoped the investigation by the senate foreign relations committee of how copies of the peace treaty reached private interests in New York would be "most thoroughly prosecuted."

Germany Owe Americans Billion. Washington.—Claims of American citizens against Germany because of submarine warfare and the action of the German government against American property in that country, aggregate nearly \$1,000,000,000, congress was informed by Acting Secretary Polk.

Wire-Release Bill to Be Pressed. Washington.—Unanimous decision to press legislation for repeal of the wire control resolution, despite Postmaster-General Burleson's order returning telegraph and telephone properties to private operation, was reached by the senate interstate commerce committee.

Wheat Yield More Than Billion. Washington.—A wheat production of 1,235,000,000 bushels this year combining the winter wheat and spring wheat crop was forecast by the department of agriculture from the condition of the crop June 1.

Germans in Battle With Baltic Armies. Stockholm.—Estonian forces have clashed with German landwehr troops in the region east of Riga, where Lettish detachments have also been in serious fighting with the Germans, according to an official statement.

Douglas Storrs is Convicted by Jury. Okanogan, Wash.—Douglas Storrs, charged with illicit relations with Miss Ruth Garrison, who poisoned Mrs. Grace Glatz Storrs, wife of Storrs, in Seattle last spring, was found guilty by a jury here.

Hurley Asks 600 Millions for Fleet

Washington.—Chairman Hurley of the shipping board has asked congress for a final appropriation of a little more than \$600,000,000 to wind up the government's shipbuilding operations.

This sum, he said, which will complete the work of raising the United States as a shipbuilding nation to first place and develop the American mercantile marine fleet from a negligible quantity to second place, actually is \$400,000,000 less than congress already has authorized.

The present needs of the shipbuilding programme, as Chairman Hurley outlines them, take into consideration the cancellation or suspension of contracts for 754 ships, which alone will effect a saving of more than \$594,000,000. The administration charges of the whole business will be only 1.22 per cent of the total final expenditure.

When all is done, Chairman Hurley points out in a letter to Chairman Good of the house appropriations committee, \$2,861,755,576 will have been expended in the country's great effort which will be shown in 13,885,106 deadweight tons of ships on the seas. Although a cost of \$206 a deadweight ton is indicated, the actual cost to the government will be less.

NAVAL COMPROMISE MADE

House and Secretary Daniels Agree on Size of Personnel.

Washington.—The house naval affairs committee agreed to meet Secretary Daniels half way on the size of the navy. In framing the 1920 bill the committee approved the secretary's recommendations that the enlisted personnel be fixed at 250,000 until October 1. From that date to January 1, Mr. Daniels wanted 225,000 men. The committee voted to put the maximum for that period at 200,000 and 175,000 thereafter, as against 200,000 thereafter, the number asked by the department.

Members estimated that the reduction in personnel meant a saving of \$150,000,000.

TO PROBE WAR DEPARTMENT

House Committee to Start Investigation This Week. Washington.—Investigation of war department expenditures by the special house committee of 11 will begin late this week, with Secretary Baker and Brigadier-General Lord, director of finance in the department, as the first witnesses.

The committee held its first meeting Saturday and unanimously adopted a resolution asking the house for unlimited funds for employing counsel, accountants and clerical help. The senate military committee will devote itself principally to permanent army legislation.

Federal Control is Urged by Stockmen. Boise, Idaho.—Government control of all the remaining public domain under the supervision of the forest service was declared for at a joint session of the Idaho Wool Growers association and Idaho Cattle and Horse Growers association here.

Jamaica Ginger Barred in Maine. Augusta, Me.—Jamaica ginger was declared to be intoxicating and its sale or possession unlawful in an opinion handed down by the supreme court.

Yanks to Leave Russia This Month. Archangel.—According to revised arrangements, all the American forces on the north Russian front will be ready for sailing the last of June.
