GRIZZLY BEAR FROM ASIA

Something Like a Million Years Ago the Animal Came Here by Way of Alaska.

The grizzly bear has been known to the white race a little more than a century. Lewis and Clark wrote the first official accounts of him in 1805, and he was first discussed publicly in 1814 by Gov. De Witt Clinton in New York city. Guthrie's old geography says that he was named Ursus horribilis by Naturalist George Ord in 1815. Fossil records indicate that the grizzly is of Asiatic origin. He appears to have come into America about a million years ago over one of the prehistoric land bridges that united Alaska and Asia. Bears and dogs are descendants from the same parent stock. The grizzly bear never eats human flesh, is not ferocious and fights only in self-defense. He leads an adventurous life, is a born explorer and ever has good wilderness manners—never makes attacks. The numerous cases in which the grizzly has been made a pet and companion of man, where he was thoughtfully, intelligently raised, show him to be a superior animal, dignified, intelligent, loyal and uniformly good tempered.

Not a grizzly exists in any of the four national parks of California, and that animal, once so celebrated in that state, is extinct there. He is also extinct over the greater portion of the vast territory which he formerly occupied, and is verging on extermination.

WAS LONG FAMOUS HIGHWAY

Cumberland Pike a Well-Traveled Road in the Early Days of the Country.

When the immigrants traversed the Santa Fe trail, when they went overland to the Golden Gate, when they traversed the prairies in every direction, they did not travel in trek carts, says Dan Beard in Boys' Life. They traveled in what were known as prairie schooners, and the prairie schooner was a direct descendant of the conestoga, and the conestoga wagon was the freight wagon that carried all the freight over the old Cumberland road, or the Old Pike, as it was sometimes called. This was the first good road from Wheeling, W. Va., to Fort Cumberland—now Cumberland, Md., a pretty little town delightfully situated on a branch of the Potomac river. There were two routes to the Ohio valley, one over the famous Boone trail to Cumberland Gap blazed on the trees in 1775. The other route was over the Braddock road to the Youghiogheey, and it was in the general direction of this road that the Cumberland pike was built, a splendid road of stone covered with gravel that passed over great arched bridges thrown across the ravines and water courses. The Cumberland road was laid out by an Indian guide and in 1848 it was acknowledged to be the greatest traveled highway in America.

DUTCH COLONIAL HOUSE POPULAR

There are many reasons why the prospective home builder should at once select the plan of the house he wants and start construction now. Building materials are higher in price than they were two years ago, but not as high as they were last fall. Labor costs a little less than it did in October, 1918. And coupled with these reasons is the fact that there will be no change during the present year in the price of materials, with a strong probability that they will go higher next year. This last statement is based on the fact that the costs of a majority of necessities have risen during the first four months of the year. Building material prices, however, have been stabilized, that is, they will go neither higher nor lower.

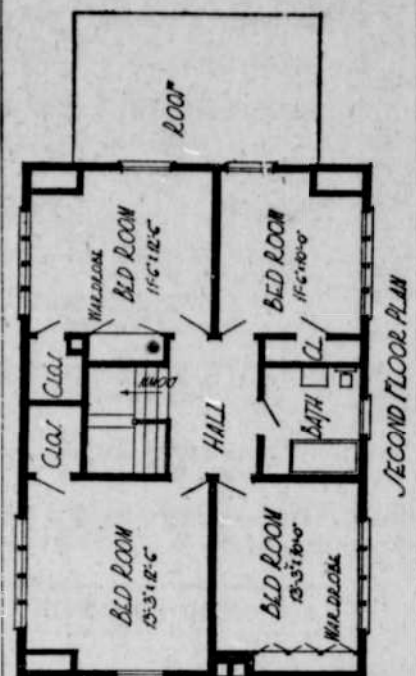
Many persons who want to build a home, and have determined on building, now that the restrictions have been removed by the government, have been doubtful about the advisability of building now. Those doubts are dispelled by the stabilizing of prices and the fact that labor is plentiful, if not cheap.

In selecting the type of home to build, every owner should take into consideration the size of house he needs, the size of lot he has upon

leading to the second floor. To the left is the living room, with a den off it, and at the right is the dining room and sun parlor, the kitchen adjoining.

The living room is of good size, being 13 feet 3 inches, by 16 feet. The fireplace is in the outside wall and has two windows on either side, which coupled with the three that can be seen in the perspective make it a light and cheerful room. The den adjoining is 12 feet 6 inches, by 6 feet 6 inches.

The dining room is 13 feet 5 inches by 14 feet 6 inches. Double door, open into the living porch, which is 15 feet by 8 feet 6 inches. This porch is equipped with glazed windows for winter use and is screened in the summer. It can be used either as a living porch or as a dining porch.



The kitchen is 11 feet 6 inches, by 8 feet and has a good-sized pantry adjoining.

On the second floor are four good-sized bedrooms opening off a center hall, and the bathroom.

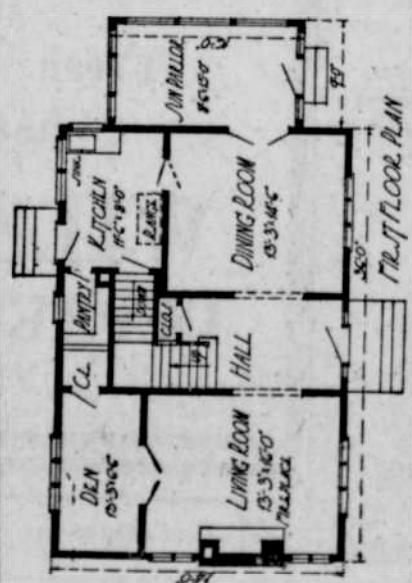
The basement extends under the whole house, with the exception of the living porch.

This house will suit the needs of the moderately large family and is equally suitable for the city, small town or the farm. Its cost is moderate



which to put it, and the style of architecture best suited to that lot. These considerations, however, carry little weight in the country where space is not so costly as in the city.

Illustrated herewith is the type of home that is in great demand in both the city and country. The Dutch colonial house is popular because of its balanced elegance and the fact that the owner gets the utmost for his money in room and convenience. Just what an attractive exterior appears



ance this type of house has is shown by the illustration, while the roominess of the interior is disclosed by the floor plan.

This house is of wood frame covered with shingles to the foundation sill. It will be noted that the house is perfectly balanced. The entrance door is in the center of the building, while on either side are the same number of windows. The sloping Dutch roof, that has a graceful sweep from ridge to second floor sill, and the jutting windows take away the plain appearance without adding the extra cost that is incurred to accomplish the same result with an odd-shaped building. The addition of the sun parlor at the end containing the dining room is a feature of this design that has an exceptional appeal.

The dimensions of this house are only 36 by 24 feet, but it contains eight rooms and bath beside the large sun parlor. The entrance leads into a center hall, in which are the stairs

This design is susceptible to several changes that might suit the builder. The den can be eliminated and the living room extended across the whole end of the house. The same may be done with the bedrooms, making all large and more airy. By consulting the local architect, or the contractor who is a practical architect these changes can easily be made. Engaging an architect is always good business for the home builder. These experts in building give the prospective builder many valuable hints that will save money and prevent disappointment.

Miss Folk has selected as her maids the following young girls, daughters of prominent suffrage leaders: Travanda Dudley, Lenore Kenny, Kate Barksdale, Harriet Ingram, Mary Sue Cantrell, Jane Davis and Elizabeth Smith.

At the christening not champagne but a bottle of coca-cola will be broken and the maids will shower the engine with yellow flowers. Speeches will be made by Mayor William Gupton, Commissioner Tompkins and Chief A. A. Rosetta.
