THE ASSOCIATION OF SOLDIERS

Americans who took arms to make the world safe for democracy will, of course, form an association. Given a large number of men with that great common experience such an association is fairly inevitable in sociable America. It is fitting and admirable.

We hear considerable discussion as to what sort of association it will turn out to be in actual practice, with what aims and what effect upon national life—and whether it will be purely sociable, or take on some political complexion and be an object of lively political intrigue or perhaps devote its attention mainly to self-interests.

What called these men together was a unique service to the country and a unique sacrifice for the cause of democracy throughout the world. We should say that motive might well be the guiding principle of the association. Democracy nowhere is made safe simply by fighting for it with arms in a great crisis. Its safety is a matter of daily living and thinking and acting. There are plenty of enemies that wear no Prussian helmets.

That democracy shall be kept safe and effective; that the will of the majority as constitutionally expressed in duly enacted laws shall be respected and obeyed in all cases—might very well be a prime object of the soldiers' association. They might stand as formidably as in France against seditions, Bolshevism, mobs. They fought for the ballot box. They might well say, first of all, "The ballot box shall rule."

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Editor Nyssa Journal, Nyssa, Oregon
My dear Sir:
Authority has been received from the War Department to initiate educational and vocational training at this Camp, in addition to the military training received. Any young man wishing to enlist is permitted to choose the Arm of the Service in which he cares to enlist. Any soldier, serving in whatever Arm is permitted, not required, to undertake educational or vocational training three hours daily during five days of the week. It is believed that this educational opportunity, furnished young men who have not yet entered college or learned a trade, will induce a large number of young men, unmarried, to enter the Army for the purpose of either increasing their earning capacity after discharge, or for the purpose of entering college in a higher grade than he would otherwise enter. The educational advantages in addition to the other privileges accorded soldiers of the Army. The present pay and allowances, such as clothing, subsistence,

quarters, medical attention, dental treatment, life insurance, etc., are usually estimated at \$100.00 per month. The improvement in the character of citizenship of those young men who served during the war must have been noted by readers of your paper. The same improvement may be gained by other young men who have not yet served in the Army.

As, undoubtedly, many readers of your paper have acquaintances at Camp Lewis, and ex-soldiers who have served at Camp Lewis will be interested in news of this Camp, I am willing to furnish you, each week, news items of the Camp, including our experience in conducting a university for young men who otherwise might not have the benefit of such education. An officer of this Camp will collect items believed to be of interest in your section and mail them to you without charge. I shall appreciate the courtesy of insertion of this letter in your paper, and of bulletins of news concerning Camp Lewis and its experience in educational and vocational training, whenever the space in your paper permits.

Honey Recipes

HONEY DROP CAKES

1-3 cup shortening, 1-2 cup of sugar 1-2 cup of honey, 1-2 cup of milk, 2 eggs 1-3-4 cup of flour, 1-4 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoonful of cinnamon 1-2 teaspoon of cloves, 2 teaspoons of baking powder a little nutmeg and a pinch of salt. Cream the sugar and the shortening add the eggs, honey, and milk. Sift the other ingredients with the flour. Bake in gem pans or in layers. Nuts raisins, or 2 tablespoons of chocolate may be added. Bake all honey cakes in a moderate oven.
