OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

The western Oregon corn show will be held in Eugene this year.

An agricultural department has been organized at the Newberg high school. Nine cars of beef cattle were shipped from Durkee to the Kansas City market.

William Spayd, a Civil war veteran and for many years a resident of Salem, died at Seattle.

The dairymen of Jackson county have organized the Jackson County Cow Testing association.

Noonday dancing as a cure for brain fog has been adopted by the students of Reed college at Portland.

The first livestock show undertaken in Deschutes county was put on in connection with the Tumalo fair.

Eight school districts in Douglas county are still without teachers, according to Superintendent Brown.

Herman Rosenberg, a well-known Umatilla county farmer, bought the Bert Smith farm of 3100 acres near Yaokum.

Ed Plogg, a resident of Dallas, disappeared October 12, and officials and his brother in Portland are trying to locate him.

Bears and cougars are causing considerable losses of young cattle in the Dry creek section of the Sisters Metolius range.

A sawmill three times the size and capacity of the one destroyed by fire last July is being erected at Peoria by Liggett & Austin.

The freshman class of Willamette university has voted to donate a walk to the university, and has appropriated the necessary funds.

One thousand gallons of grape wine, confiscated from Italian residents, were poured into the Columbia river at St. Helens last week.

Preliminary plans are being made for the Oregon Christian Endeavor convention which will be held in Albany February 20, 21 and 22.

Seven rural schools in Lane county, three of them Union high schools, are closed because the boards of directors are unable to obtain teachers.

Fire, starting from the explosion of an oil stove, completely destroyed the women's living quarters at the plant of the Dufur Orchard company.

At a special election, Monmouth by a vote of 20 to 1 went on record in favor of a gravity water system, voting \$60,000 in bonds to pay for it.

The application of sulphur to alfalfa land has increased the yield so materially in central Oregon that Umatilla alfalfa growers are going to try it out.

Judson T. Bowman, 75, a veteran of the Civil war, was instantly killed when he was struck by a Southern Pacific passenger train near Grants Pass.

Bids for approximately 157 miles of graveling, grading and surfacing will be opened at the Portland offices of the state highway commission on November 4.

The Shell company of California paid to the secretary of state a total of \$1176.93 for gasoline and distillate sold in Oregon during the month of September.

L. H. Linbarger, a cattleman, has just shipped 200 head of cattle from Creswell to Ukiah, Cal., where they will be fed and sold later to buyers in that state.

In response to a call recently issued by County Agent Hunt, representative farmers from all parts of Morrow county met at Heppner and organized a farm bureau.

The fishermen's strike on the Siuslaw and Umpqua rivers has been called off. The fishermen are selling their salmon for the same price as before, 8 1/2 cents a pound.

Morrow county was covered with a blanket of snow last week. Most of the sheep are out of the mountains or low enough down to be out of danger of being snowed in.

Sawmills in all sections of Linn county are unusually busy and a large quantity of lumber and railroad ties are being shipped from many railroad points in the county.

The Bend city council has approved plans for a \$133,000 extension of the sewer system and ordered engineers' estimates on grading and surfacing of several miles of streets.

Between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 eastern brook trout eggs will be taken from Elk lake this winter for the Tumalo hatchery, according to the plans of Pearl Lynes, superintendent.

On account of ill health, Mayor E. W. Hinman of Dufur resigned his office at the last regular meeting of the city council. The office is still vacant, no one being willing to accept the place.

Inheritance taxes aggregating \$213,495.10 were received by the state treasurer during the period from October 1, 1917, to September 30, 1919, according to a report prepared by that department.



The Red Cross button is the most widely worn button in the world. Thirty million men and women and children in the United States now wear this emblem of countless good deeds accomplished. For the third year in America comes universal opportunity to wear it.

There are many instances of how this button, bearing upon a white background a tiny cross, has been worn and treasured. One morning in a distant northwest county, a man whose ruddy, optimistic countenance was clothed with ruddy beard, asked the Red Cross chairman if he had another button like the one he wore. The chairman gave him his own. "I have twelve children," explained the man. "I gave my button to the twelfth, a new arrival, this morning. When I have anything good the whole family must come in on it."

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

The steamer Pocahontas is en route from London with 100 English wives of American soldiers and sailors.

The most serious food shortage in its history threatens New York as a result of the unauthorized longshoremen's strike.

For the third consecutive term ex-President Taft has been elected president of the general conference of the Unitarian church societies at Baltimore.

Allied nations have agreed to make their nominations of ambassadors to Berlin dependent upon the manner in which the clauses of the treaty of peace are carried out by Germany.

No relief from the present sugar situation is in sight and the probabilities are that conditions will become worse, the senate agriculture committee was told by Doctor Alonzo Taylor of the department of agriculture.

Danger of an influenza epidemic this fall has not passed, but the outlook is hopeful, because cases reported generally are of a mild type, Surgeon General Rupert Blue of the United States public health service announced.

Workers' Rehabilitation Bill Passed. Washington.—The house has passed and sent to the senate a bill providing for vocational rehabilitation of persons disabled in industry.
