### BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

More than 1000 treaties trying the American flag have been added to the commercial shipping of the United States since the signing of the armistice.

The British House of Lords has rejected the clause in the bill for the removal of sex disqualifications which would permit women to sit in the House of Lords.

President Wilson, stopped in the great railway bed in which Idriss Bey, late King Edward VII, departs when he visited Washington in 1909, greeted the grandson of that British king in Albert Edward, prince of Wales.

William E. Johnson, an American prohibition worker, familiarly known as "Pussyfoot," was dragged from a platform from which he was speaking in London, severely beaten and paraded on a plank through two miles of crowded streets.

Under modification of conditions governing readjustment of disabled soldiers announced by the war risk insurance board, no statement as to physical condition will be required within three months after discharge from the service.

In the presence of delegations of American Legion men from all parts of Washington and some from Oregon and other states, memorial services were held in Centennial, Wash., over the bodies of the four former service men who fell before I. W. W. sniper bullets while marching in an armistice day parade.

### HAWAIIAN SUGAR EDGEE

Pacific Northwest Want Fairly Good Beet Sugar

San Francisco, Cal.—Exhaustion of the Hawaiian cane sugar crop has made central and northern California, Oregon, Washington, northern Idaho and Nevada consumers entirely dependent upon the remaining beet sugar crop. The Pacific coast office of the sugar equalization board stated in an announcement that a price of 16 cents a pound for beet sugar at the factory would be effective.

The new beet sugar price is an advance of 1 cent over the price at which the refinery sold cane sugar and makes possible a retail figure of 22 cents, as wholesalers are allowed a profit of half a cent a pound, while the millers may charge 1 1/2 cents additional.



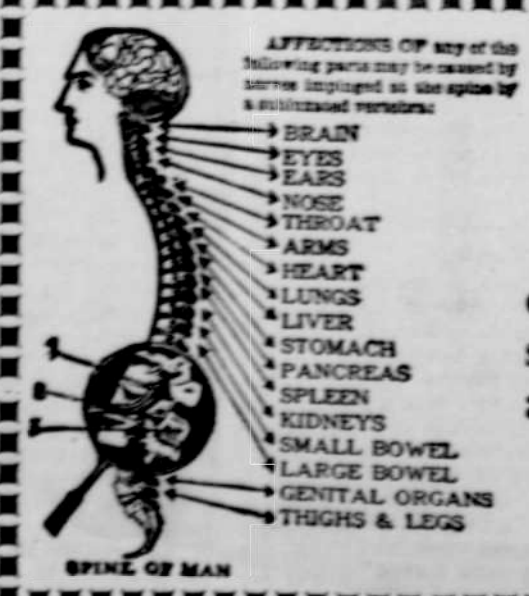
