## RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION TO BE HELD SOON

## ONTARIO C. C. HOLD MEETING TO OPPOSE HIGHER POWER RATES

The Ontario Commercial Club held a meeting last Wednesday evening and appointed a committee to make arrangements to appear before the the Utilities Commission at the hearings to be held in the near future to show why the power rates for irrigation purposes should not be increased to such prices as the Power Company's asking.

The committee appointed by the Ontario Commercial Club for the purpose of gathering all the necessary data and who are to receive all the necessary information the power users may send in are: Mayor R. W. Jones, D. M. Taggart, T. W. Claggett, H. B. Cockrum and W. J. Pinney.

## OREGON ASSEMBLY IN SPECIAL SESSION

Salem, Ore.—The Oregon legislature convened in special session Monday morning. Governor Olcott in his message to the legislature made the following recommendations:

Increase in the compensation provided for injured workmen and their dependents under the workmen's compensation law.

Additional funds to carry out the soldiers', sailors' and marines' educational act.

Supplementary legislation to make irrigation and drainage district bonding act workable.

Submission to electorate of constitutional amendment restoring capital punishment.

Amendment of parole law so as to permit flat sentences on persons convicted of the graver crimes.

Ratification of women's suffrage amendment.

Separate commissions for the commercial fishing and game interests of state.

That only paramount legislation be considered.

Many bills have been placed before the houses for consideration. Whether these will be considered during the special session is problematical, as feeling for a short session and against the full 20-day special allotment is strong.

Resolutions ratifying the national woman's suffrage amendment was the first legislation in both branches of the legislature. The vote on the suffrage resolution was unanimous in both houses.

## BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Representative Webster of Washington was chosen to deliver the Lincoln day address in the house on February 12.

The death list in eastern Mexico from recent earthquakes, floods and volcanic eruptions is estimated at 7000.

Resolutions approving the anti-strike clause of the Cummins railroad bill were adopted by the Iowa Farm Bureau federation.

Governor Charles J. McCarthy and a group of Hawaiian legislators are en route to Washington to present a plea to have Hawaii granted statehood.

San Francisco was selected by the democratic national committee as the place for the party's 1920 national convention, and Monday, June 28, was fixed as the convention date.

Charges before a house war investigating committee that lives of American soldiers were wasted in needless attacks on armistice day were denied in a letter from General Pershing, made public by Representative Fuller, republican, Massachusetts.

The estimated requirements of the United States government, not including anything for the railroad administration for the next fiscal year, were placed at \$5,250,000,000 by James W. Good of Iowa, chairman of the house committee on appropriations.

## Fight at Tijuana Rouses Governor.

Sacramento, Cal.—Governor William D. Stephens of California announced that he would ask the government at Washington to enforce passport restrictions that would prevent the proposed world's championship bout between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier at Tijuana, Mexico, just across the border line from California.

Last of Americans Return From Brest. New York.—The last contingent of troops quartered at the military camp at Brest arrived here Monday on the transport George Washington.

1,000,000 Cases of Influenza in Japan. Tokyo.—Influenza is spreading throughout Japan. There are 1,000,000 cases reported, of which 12,000 are soldiers.

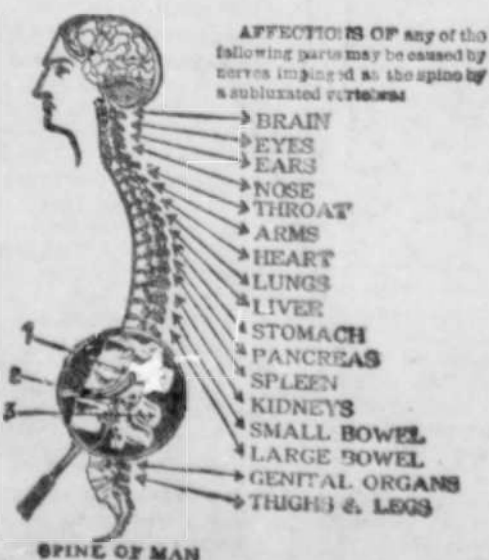

## OREGON NEWS IN BRIEF

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers

D. F. Fisher, government biologist at Wenatchee, Wash., directed by the secretary of agriculture to make an investigation of the willow and ascertain if there is a possibility of saving many trees for the investigation by Senator McNary, who has ordered of serious damage to the reason of the December 1st announcement was made and by W. K. Newell, federal administrator for Oregon, a price of 18 cents per pound, a cane sugar will be permitted to flow, owing to the prevailing wholesale. Mr. Newell also made a decision of himself and of the States District Attorney Huelskamp to accept at the rate of 13-cent rate.

The rabbit poisoning campaign west end of Umatilla county under the direction of the cultural agent, Fred Benton, has had a big success. Colonel J. N. Knight, county farm bureau leader, secured the cooperation of ranchers who prepared six traps poisoned with strychnine over the snow over of nearly 100 miles, to protect acres of cultivated land. Count made on six representative lots totaling 90 pounds and 12 rabbits were found. Using this basis it is safe to say that 100,000 rabbits were exterminated this campaign.

When the special session of the legislature adjourned Sunday 1 o'clock, it left a record of 94 bills, and a number of amendments and other bills to be submitted to the voters at the special election. Extending road limitation from 2 to 4 per cent; the debts and liabilities of counties to fund their relating to succession to govern providing president of senate restoring capital punishment providing additional tax levy on educational aid; levy on tax of 2 mills for support of elementary schools; levy on tax for erection, equipment maintenance of institution for providing tax of 1.2 mills for University of Oregon, agricultural and Monmouth normal; to acquiring of private land for public purposes.

National Banks Set New Record. Washington, D. C.—With record aggregating \$22,444,992,000 on January 17, national banks of the United States have established a new growth and development, announced by John Skelton W. controller. Between the call of December 12 and November 17 national resources increased \$8,000,000. A gain of \$2,623,538,000 for the year ending November 17 was recorded.

Reclamation Bond Issue Proposed. Washington.—A new bill to issue a federal bond issue of \$250,000,000 for land reclamation projects in the states will be substituted in pending bill to make a direct appropriation, Senator McNary, Oregon republican, author of the pending bill, announced at a meeting with congressional steering committee with governors and other representatives of western states.

Japan Approaches China on Shantung. Tokyo.—The Japanese government according to the newspapers, sections to Yukihi Obata, the minister to China, to notify the Peking government that Japan, having succeeded Germany's rights in Shantung January 10 by virtue of the treaty, was ready now to negotiate for their return.

Navy in Need of 60,000. Washington, D. C.—An existing naval force of 143,157 for the year was recommended by Rear Admiral William H. S. G. told the house naval committee that the house naval committee of 60,000 recruits or re-enlistment would be necessary to reach strength.
