TRIAL OF REDS AT MONTESANO BEGINS

Montesano, Wash.—With Judge John M. Wilson of the superior court for Thurston and Mason counties presiding, a trial of the 11 alleged I. W. W. charged with the murder of Warren O. Grimm, opened Monday morning here.

The crime with which the Reds are charged was committed while the American Legion parade in honor of the signing of the armistice was passing the I. W. W. hall in Centralia the afternoon of November 11.

Four American Legion members marching in a parade were killed by bullets fired from the I. W. W. headquarters and from the upper windows of two hotels across the street from the Red hall.

Ten alleged I. W. W. are charged with the murder of Lieutenant Warren O. Grimm. Elmer Smith, alleged Red attorney, is to be tried at the same time on a charge of knowing the shooting was planned.

Two weeks, it is believed, will be required to get a jury. Only ninety-two of the jurymen called on January 5 remain and a second venire will be called immediately.

The state has called 239 witnesses. Attorney George F. Vanderveer, for the defense, says he will call more than 100.

Poster Tells Dramatic Story



This picture, painted especially for the Near East Relief by M. Leone Bracker, vividly portrays what words fail to express—the horrible suffering of the women and children of Armenia and adjacent countries. Peace has blessed Europe and America for more than a year but in Western Asia conditions more frightful than any war time experiences of the martyred populations of Belgium and France still exist. Thousands of women and children escaped massacre by the Turkish soldiers only to face the terrible agonies of death by starvation. At the present time it is estimated that 1,250,000 adults and fully 250,000 orphaned children are completely destitute and in imminent danger of death by starvation and exposure.

The Near East Relief, 1 Madison Avenue, New York, is at present the only organization giving aid to these suffering people and lack of funds still prevents the reaching of more than a small part of the stricken people.

NO CHANGE IN RESERVATIONS. DUTCH REFUSE TO GIVE UP EX-KAISER

Washington.—No change in the reservations affecting article 1 of the League of Nations covenant or the Monroe doctrine provision of the peace treaty will be acceptable to the republicans. Senator Lodge informed Senator Hitchcock and other members of the informal democratic committee which had been conferring with Senator Lodge's committee in an effort to reach a compromise on the treaty.

Senate Refuses to Censure Sims. Washington.—The senate rejected, 33 to 30, an effort by Senator Walsh, Mont., to call up his resolution proposing to censure Rear Admiral William S. Sims for disclosure of information of a "confidential character" in connection with his appearance before the sub-committee investigating naval decoration awards. The vote was on strict party lines.
