BOYCOTT JAPANESE GOODS

San Francisco Chinese Residents Burn Merchandise in Streets.

San Francisco, Cal.—Amid the clang of tom-toms and the shrill shriek of pipes, great stacks of Japanese goods were burned in the streets of Chinatown at 6 o'clock as the first gun of an intensive campaign on the part of Chinese merchants to boycott Japanese goods, as a protest against Japanese occupation of Shantung.

This marks the arrival in California of the orient-wide boycott against Japanese goods.

Thousands of Chinese thronged the narrow streets, and many brought Japanese goods which had been bought before the boycott had been declared and placed them on the sacrificial fire.

ADDITIONAL FEED FOR

PROPER QUARTERS FOR
