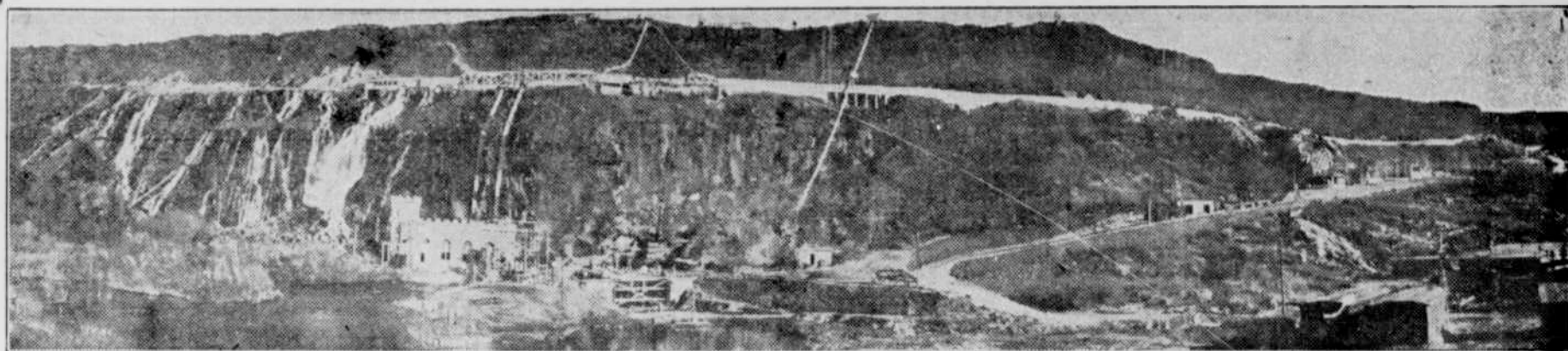


HARNESSING A THOUSAND SPRINGS SO THE PEOPLE MAY BE SERVED

In 1912 the first unit of the Thousand Springs plant was completed, with a generating capacity of 2700 horsepower. The new unit, now under construction will generate 8000 horsepower, making this plant capable of producing 13,300 horsepower of electrical energy. Most of this will be used for irrigation purposes in the summertime—for pumping water from the Snake river to make the parched lands spring into waving fields of alfalfa, wheat and other grains, or become checkered with fruitful orchards.
