EAST RELIEF FUND

The drive for the Near East Relief closed with Easter. The quota assigned to Nyssa and adjoining territory in Oregon was \$500. There has been sent off \$841.26 cash, and \$116.70 in subscriptions. This makes in all \$957.96. This will all soon be in Armenia in the shape of food for the starving children. All the schools contributed liberally to this noble cause, but the Kingman school is the banner school as it gave \$41. The schools of Nyssa gave \$35. The contributing districts for the banner are Kingman Colony and the Owyhee. The schools in Big Bend and the community and the Warren school and community all did fine. A few checks are yet to come in but that which is paid in or subscribed as above has been sent forward. In behalf of the Near East Relief I take this opportunity to express appreciation of the liberality of the school children and the people in general.
