MANY ENROLLED IN COUNTY CLUB WORK

There are now 152 boys and girls in Malheur county enrolled in Club Work, and it is expected that this number will be more than doubled during the next month. Standard clubs organized are: 2 Corn, Potato, Sheep, 2 Pig, 2 Poultry, 2 Sewing. There are also a number of scattered individuals enrolled in these and other projects. Several other clubs are in the process of organization and their enrollments will be in soon.

Three boys in the Big Bend community will raise corn this year. These club members are: Ira Brumbrich, Wesley Roberts, and Wilbur Roberts. Nyssa clubs have all their organization meetings, elected their officers, and begun work on their projects. The county club leader held a short meeting with each club Wednesday. Oregon Slope club boys will raise corn and sheep. The Hampshire is the breed or sheep chosen by the Farm Bureau for the club project, and purebred stock will be purchased for the boys soon.

Club work will be organized at Ontario, Broomfield, and Bonita soon.

WHY OBSERVE SUNDAY

The writer has been reading some bits of history lately, that have to do with the customs of various Peoples of the world; and has run across some interesting facts.

We learn among other things that all peoples and races adopted certain times and days for the observance of rites and ceremonies which they deemed vital to their moral, intellectual and spiritual well being.

This we find the early angels setting apart one day in seven, for the worship of God, to whom they sang ode, and made their sacrifices—so we have Woodens day or Wednesday.

Likewise the Scandinavians worshipped Thor on Thor's day or Thursday—the earlier civilized people around the Mediterranean set aside a day for the worship of Saturn, and we have Saturday. The Persians worshipped what they believed to be the source of all physical life on Sunday—now in every case we learn that the national life crumbled around these observances, and the blackest pages in history is the record of the time when the Revolution of France set aside the Christian Calendar, wholly obliterated Sunday, changed the date from September 1, 1792 to year One of the Republic; tore from the cemetery entrance the legend "I am the Resurrection, and placed there instead the words "Death is an eternal sleep."

The regime of blood and terror that followed is well known to all students of history.

I would not have my readers think that I believe such dire consequences will be meted out to us because we disregard Sunday. But I do read in these acts unmistakable signs of decay,—for no nation can be strong and virile with a decadent people. Neither can we hope to attain the highest development—possible to us, so long as we disregard Sunday, or any other days that were established with the two fold purpose in view, these are our moral and spiritual development, and recreation.

Mark you recreation and idle amusement, and dissipation, are not necessarily re-creation.

Sunday is the day that all christian nations, real or so called, have by common consent set aside for the purpose mentioned.

The question arises—"Can we without jeopardizing our spiritual, intellectual and moral well being, set aside the real purpose of our Sunday, and instead, indulge in practices that, even though we can not bring ourselves to believe are not destructive, yet are not calculated to uplift or re-create. Do not misunderstand me, dear reader I would not have Sunday a day of long, tiresome nothingness but I would have it a day brim full of activity—but along different lines than those of the other days of the week. If I seek amusements of the popular kind four or five evenings in the week, would it not be well to give one evening to my intellectual and spiritual development? And if the institutions now in operation do not meet my needs it is my duty, as a factor in the community life to assist in eliminating the wrong things, and propose the good.
