Oregon has 16,000,000 acres of tillable land now uncultivated.

Oregon produced 20,400,000 bushels of wheat in 1919.

If Oregon's 16,000,000 acres of tillable but uncultivated land were planted in wheat and the yield were the Oregon average for ten years—21.9 bushels per acre—new production would be 350,400,000 bushels which, at the price today of \$3 per bushel, would mean a cash value of \$1,051,200,000.

The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce expects to double the number of farmers in three years. If this means double the wheat crop, it will mean an additional yield of 20,400,000 bushels of wheat, which at the prevailing price would mean a cash value of new money of \$61,200,000.

LA FOLLETTE MAY
HEAD NEW PARTY

Chicago.—Declaration by Amos Pinchot, member of the committee of forty-eight, that there positively would be a new party presidential candidate in the field, rumors that Senator La Follette would head a ticket as presidential candidate, and announcement that the campaign in behalf of Senator Warren G. Harding, republican presidential nominee, would be started promptly were the outstanding developments following the republican national convention.

Reports concerning Senator La Follette's possible candidacy were less clearly defined and in some instances were linked with declarations made in behalf of the committee of forty-eight.

Harry M. Daugherty, pre-convention campaign manager for senator Harding, began preparations for the presidential nominee's campaign by requesting the national committee to take "prompt, snappy and energetic action" in placing the merits of the republican issues before the voters of the country.

Party managers, it was said, would start the campaign soon after the democratic convention is held and would not wait until Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge are officially notified of their nomination.

ARMY CLASSIFICATION
BOARDS ARE NAMED

Washington.—First steps toward the reorganization of the army under the law passed at the recent session of congress were taken by Secretary of War Baker when he announced the appointment of four boards to prepare classifications of officers.

One, which is assigned to prepare an initial list of officers eligible for general staff duty, is headed by General John J. Pershing.

Another board is headed by Lieutenant-General Robert L. Bullard. This board will classify officers who are to be retained in the service, and those who should not be retained.

The third board, appointed by Secretary Baker, is to prepare an eligible list for brigadier generals and is headed by Lieutenant General Hunter Liggett.

The fourth board appointed by Secretary Baker is to prepare a promotion list of all officers who were appointed to the regular army or the Philippine scouts prior to April 6, 1917. Officers will be placed on this list according to their length of commissioned service, and will be promoted as vacancies occur from the top of the list.

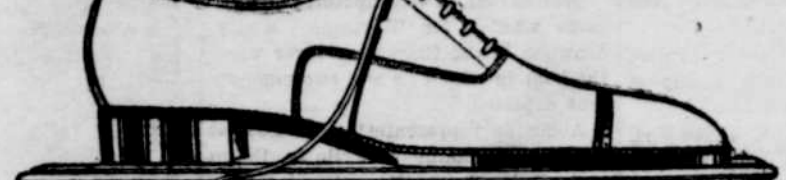
