The Hood River Anti-Asiatic assoc- iation has approved the action of Gov- ernor Stephens of California in asking the state department to cooperate in the exclusion of Japanese.

According to Frank L. Calkins, as- sessor, one-third of the special school tax levies voted in the various school districts of Douglas county are void because of failure to give proper notice.

Voters of the Klamath irrigation district have ratified the proposal to enter into a contract with the federal government for the expenditure of \$225,000 for the improvement of the Klamath project irrigation system.

The strike called recently by the clerks' union of Bend was ended by the Bend merchants' association when an agreement with the union was signed which amended the contract previously submitted by the clerks so as to elim- inate a clause calling for the closed shop.

Preparing for Big Crop at Idanha

Apartments for Employees Latest Innovation; Twice Previous Yield of Prunes Is Predicted.

Johnny Cancelmo, manager of the Idanha Orchard, is making prepara- tions to take care of the largest crop in the history of that famous pro- ducer.

Commodious quarters for the em- ployes are being constructed by Con- tractor Fred Green and his gang of carpenters and the structure is now about ready for the painters. It is 103 feet long by 10 feet wide, divided into 10 apartments. It is finished in- side with plaseer board, and will be painted inside and out. Electric lights in each apartment will give the appearance of a modern city apart- ment house.

Experienced orchard men state that the crop his year will be heavy. Owing to the fact that a large number of young trees will produce this year for the first time, they es- timate that the yield will be double that of any previous year.
