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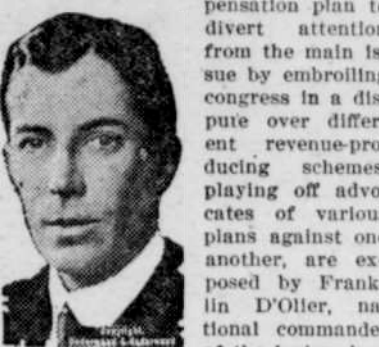

DISCUSSES FOURFOLD PLAN

National Commander D'Olier Advises
That Prompt Action Is Necessary
To Get Results.

Attempts of opponents of the Ameri-
can Legion's fourfold optional com-
pensation plan to divert attention
from the main issue by embroiling
congress in a dispute over differ-
ent revenue-producing schemes,
playing off advocates of various
plans against one another, are ex-
posed by Franklin D'Olier, national
commander of the legion, in a
signed article in a recent issue of the
American Legion Weekly. He writes:



"The American Legion's fight for the
fourfold optional compensation plan
has entered a new phase.

"The opposition, defeated in its at-
tempt to invoke popular sentiment
against the measure itself, has turned
from the direct to the indirect method
of attack. The new strategy is to
strike the bill, through the instrument
of a fomented controversy over meth-
ods of money raising.

"Already the attempt is being made
to divert attention from the bill to
the question of the means by which
the money shall be raised to carry out
its provisions. If the advocates of
different revenue-producing schemes
can be played off against one another
the congress embroiled in a dispute
over money raising, in which the bill,
occupying the role of innocent by-
stander, shall receive a mortal blow,
this design will have succeeded.

"The fourfold plan has withstood
the closest scrutiny. The economic
soundness of the land settlement,
home aid and vocational training op-
tions and the fact that the fourth op-
tion can be paid automatically to the
dependents of those who died, to all
disabled and to those needing assist-
ance, makes the plan the best solution
of the problem of beneficial legisla-
tion.

"The fourfold plan is the only one
which will benefit the veterans and
their families. It is the only one
which will not cost the government
anything. It is the only one which
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BACK TO EARTH WITH BUMP

Oregon and Wyoming Land Fiascos
Not Creditable to Nation, Says
Legion Weekly.

The Oregon and Wyoming land fias-
cos, states a writer in The American
Legion Weekly, are not exactly cred-
itable to a nation that prides itself,
above all else, on its business effec-
iency. The machinery jammed some-
where—what machinery there was—
for when farms go to 79 men out of
170,000, who exhibit enough interest to
write to Washington about the land,
then it is evident too few wheels are
grinding.

To the returning soldier his familiar
America took on the aspect of an El
Dorado. He reappraised it with
something of the practical idealism of
the immigrant. To be sure, he knew
its streets were not gold paved, but
he recollected how he had always
heard it was the land of opportunity
and how, from boyhood, he had seen
people taking advantage of the oppor-
tunity. And to whom would America
quicker extend the helping hand than
her home-coming defenders?

He had been shaken out of a rut in
which he probably would have lived
and died but for the war's coming.
Being out, he determined not to drop
back. He heard the call of the land.

Picture the feelings, then, of some
800 of these pioneers who traveled to
Wyoming only to find that less than a
tenth of them could get the land they
sought. Picture the feelings of the
men who went to Oregon to be shown
desolate tracts that reminded of the
rockiest, thorniest passes of the Ar-
gonne.

The land and home features of the
legion's four-fold compensation plan
cannot make the desert bloom, nor can
they divide government sections so as
to make room for all comers. But they
can see to it that the machinery is ad-
equate to give all land-loving ex-ser-
vice men opportunity to establish their
homes wherever they want them; and
to prevent such costly and disappoint-
ing stampedes as Oregon and Wyom-
ing just have witnessed.

OBJECTS OF THE AUXILIARY

Women's Branch of Legion Has Same
Ideas and Plans as Men's
Organization.

The objects of the women's auxil-
iary are the same as those expressed
in the constitution of the American
Legion, and as that constitution was
adopted conformably to the act of
congress of September 16, 1919, incor-
porating the legion, the auxiliary and
all its units.

"For God and Country," reads the
preamble to the constitution, "we as-
sociate ourselves together for the fol-
lowing purposes:

"To uphold and defend the Consti-
tution of the United States of America,
to maintain law and order, to foster
and perpetuate a 100 per cent Ameri-
canism; to preserve the memories and
incidents of our association in the
great war; to inculcate a sense of in-
dividual obligation to the community,
state and nation; to combat the auto-
cracy of both the classes and the
masses; to make right the master of
might; to promote peace and good will
on earth; to safeguard and transmit
to posterity the principles of justice,
freedom and democracy; to consecrate
and sanctify our comradeship by our
devotion to mutual helpfulness."

There are many forces which have
served to give impetus to the move-
ment among eligible American women
to become actively identified with the
legion through one or another of its
more than 9,000 community posts, but
to this preamble, more than to any
other one thing, is attributed the suc-
cess and nation-wide enthusiasm
which has greeted everywhere the
suggestion of forming an auxiliary
unit. When it is considered that this
suggestion usually comes from the in-
dividual legionnaire direct to his
mother, wife, sister or daughter, who
in turn transmits it to women rela-
tives of other legionnaires in her
community, thus invited to join by the
double instigation both within and out-
side the immediate family circle, it is
easily understood that such an appeal
proves almost universally irresistible.

LEGION'S FOURFOLD PROGRAM

Members Urged to Familiarize Them-
selves With Facts Concerning Ben-
eficial Legislation.

The American Legion's fourfold op-
tional plan of beneficial legislation em-
braces the following provisions:

1. Land settlement, whereby ex-
service men will be assisted in pur-
chasing a farm in any state, reimburse-
ing the government for funds ad-
vanced by easy payments extending
over a period of ten years or more.

2. Home aid, whereby ex-service men,
chasing a home.

3. Vocational training, whereby an
ex-service man may learn a trade or
vocation with the assistance of the
government.

4. Adjusted compensation based on
length of military service. This would
go automatically to the beneficiaries
of those who died in service, to all dis-
abled men, and to those ex-service men
who do not elect to avail themselves
of one of the foregoing provisions.

The plan is designed to overcome
the financial disadvantages incidental
to military service. It is the result of
a careful study of the needs and
wishes of ex-service men of every
state. The economic value to the
United States of re-establishing the
ex-soldier in the present period of re-
adjustment and low production is con-
sidered to be great.

The legion has asked that congress,
in meeting the nation's obligation to
the ex-service man, be as liberal as is
consistent with the welfare of the
country. It has recommended that
the extent to which assistance is given
the individual ex-service man be
based upon his length of service.

Members of the legion are urged to
familiarize themselves with these
facts so that they may assist in dis-
solving the misunderstanding now sur-
rounding the legion's program.

Ohio Post Sets Record.

Springfield, O., has hung up a record
in getting new members for the Legion
that other communities will have a
hard time bettering. The Springfield
post put on its campaign for four
days recently. The city was organized
into ward and precinct teams. Soli-
citors worked in pairs and backed ap-
plicants into corners and took their
cash, usually without protest. The
names of men who refused to join
were turned in at post headquarters
and a corps of expert salesmen were
put on the trail of these hard nuts.
The friendly co-operation of business
houses, newspapers and motion pic-
ture theaters was secured. The result
loomed up when the dust settled after
the four days and it was discovered
that the post had increased its mem-
bership from 150 to 1,700.

Sure Was Embarrassed.

LIVE STOCK

HIGH-CLASS HORSES NEEDED

No Provision Made for Future by
Many Farmers Who Are Using
Up Their Work Stock.

The thing most needed in the pro-
duction of work horses for American
farms is greater care in the selection
of the stallion and the blood mare,
say animal husbandry experts of the
United States department of agricul-
ture, who have been studying the pres-
ent situation with respect to horses.
Not only was there a net decrease of
approximately 373,000 in the number
of horses on farms on January 1, com-
pared with a year ago, but the experts
are of the opinion that there has been
an even more marked decrease in the
number of mares bred during 1919.
The extent of this decrease cannot be
accurately determined until the colt
crop of 1920 is estimated. However,
if the decline in breeding is as great
as conditions now indicate, the coun-

try will be confronted with a seriously
depleted supply of good horses within
the next few years.

Many farmers are using up their
work stock without making any pro-
vision for the future. Such a policy
is short-sighted and will have serious
results, according to department of
agriculture representatives. The pres-
ent need is to increase the percentage
of efficient horses by careful selection
of parents. One of the principal fac-
tors from which the market is suffer-
ing is the breeding of too many low-
grade work animals. There is a strong
demand for high-class horses, at good
prices, the department says.

TUBERCULOSIS MAY AVOIDS DIO

Information Shows That 59,547 Car-
casses of Cattle Were Condemned
on Inspection.

Tuberculosis was responsible for the
condemnation of more cattle, slaugh-
tered under federal meat inspection
last year, than all other diseases com-
bined. Information from the bureau
of animal industry, United States de-
partment of agriculture, shows that
59,547 carcasses of cattle were con-
demned on post-mortem inspection and
of that number 37,000 were the result
of tuberculosis. In addition 53,652
parts of cattle carcasses were con-
demned for the same cause.

The bureau points out that tuber-
culosis in cattle and hog cholera in
swine are the two most serious con-
tagious diseases affecting meat ani-
mals, and there is evidence that a
heavy loss occurs on farms in addition
to condemnations at establishments
where government inspection is main-
tained. The department of agricul-
ture is prepared to give information
on the best methods of reducing the
losses.

MORE HOGS WERE IMMUNIZED

Chief Purpose of Inspection Is to Per-
mit Reshipment to Farms and
Feed Yards.

An outstanding feature of federal
activities for the control of hog chol-
era during the last year was the great
increase in the number of swine im-
munized so that they might be dis-
tributed from public stockyards for
purposes other than slaughter. The
last report of the bureau of animal
industry, United States department of
agriculture, gives the number of feed
hogs immunized as 614,673. This is
a large increase over the preceding
year. The chief purpose of the in-
spection and inoculation is to permit
reshipment to farms and feeding
yards for further growth or fattening
without danger to herds in which they
are introduced.

SHEEP DOGS IN QUARANTINE

Examination Showed Many of Im-
ported Animals Were Infested
With Various Parasites.

Because of the danger to live stock,
especially sheep, of the gid tapeworm,
imported sheep dogs are subjected to
federal quarantine. Sheep dogs have
been found to harbor that parasite.
During the last fiscal year representa-
tives of the United States department
of agriculture examined 131 imported
sheep dogs for the presence of para-
sites transmitted to live stock, and
69 were found to be infested with
parasites of various kinds. Twenty-
two showed the presence of tape-
worms, and one of the tapeworms ex-
pelled by treatment proved to be o
the dangerous gid variety.
