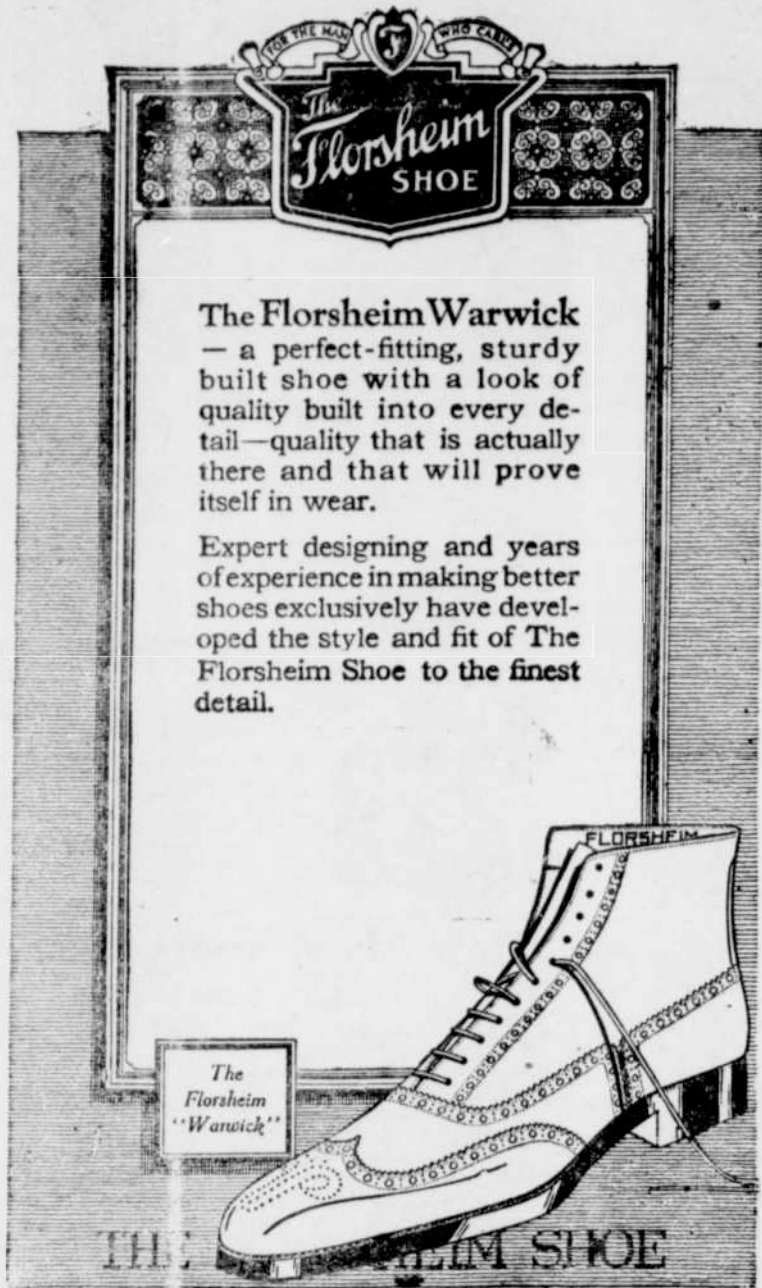

The census report gives Pendleton a population of 7387, an increase of 2927, or 65.6 per cent.

Issuing of \$100,000 bonds for harbor development was voted at a meeting of the Port of Portland.

Beginning July 1, clerks and carriers of the Eugene postoffice have had their salaries increased \$200 per year.

The extremely hot days in Southern Oregon recently caused many forest fires from the electrical storms in the mountains.

The Astoria city council has authorized a landing slope for hydroplanes to be constructed at the foot of Forty-second street, in that city.

Better wheat and better prices for the Linn county product constitute the purpose of a general campaign launched by S. V. Smith, county agent.

Governor Olcott appointed W. D. McCurry of Portland, to succeed Edwin A. Hatch, who has resigned as a member of the Oregon board of pharmacy.

The Linn county threshermen's convention will be held at Albany, July 17, to establish a uniform charge for threshing and fixing wages for the season.

E. Woodson of Heppner was appointed a member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon to succeed Judge Bean of Portland, who resigned.

Frank M. Erickson, formerly head of the department of education in the University of Idaho, has been elected professor of education in Willamette university.

Insane Man Starts Asylum Fire.
Salem, Or.—George Lenine, Italian, escaped from the farm of the state hospital for the insane about 12:30 o'clock Monday morning and it is thought that before he got away Lenine set fire to a large barn on the grounds, which was destroyed with a loss estimated at \$32,000.

National Educators Carry Out Program
Salt Lake City.—Reorganization on a delegate plan was voted and virtually all other "administration" plans were carried through, including election of Fred M. Hunter of Oakland, Cal., as president, at a business meeting of the National Education association.

A term of from three to 20 days in the county jail awaits automobile and motorcycle speeders in Salem as the result of an ordinance passed by the city council.

According to State Veterinarian Lytle thousands of cattle from Western Oregon are being shipped into Idaho and Montana to replenish herds of those states.

Work Starts On the Succor Creek Market Road

Last week's Ontario Argus contained the following concerning the Nyssa Jordan Valley market road, the construction of which is just being started: "County Road Master J. F. Joice and Division Engineer R. H. Baldock, returned Friday from Jordan Valley, where they accompanied Locating Engineer Drinkall with a corps of surveyors last week and spent several days in preliminary work preparatory to the construction of the marketing road between Jordan Valley and Nyssa.

"Mr. Joice states that Mr. Drinkall and crew are now busily engaged in making the locating survey and that construction work will start about August first, with an outlay of about \$80,000.

"He also states that the Highway Department has tractors at work on the road between Vale and Brogan, 16 miles of which, via Jamison, will be rushed to a speedy completion.

"The construction of these roads will be of unestimable benefit to the farmers of those sections as when completed they will be the means of the saving of much time and expense in the marketing of their produce."

Don Davis, Nyssa Aviator, Lost in Dense Forest

University of Oregon, July 13.—Forced to make a hasty landing because of engine trouble with his DeHaviland plane, and then lost in the woods along the north Umpqua river for twenty-four hours was the experience of Observer Don Davis, a student of the University of Oregon, who is working during the summer as observer for the forest fire patrol. The machine, piloted by Cadet Heyer, became unmanageable, landed in a section of the woods from which it was impossible to rescue it, and the two were forced to search through the woods for some means of communication with the patrol base. Word was

first received from the men through Roseburg late Thursday afternoon while the men had last reported at Medford at 1:30 Wednesday afternoon. Heyer and Davis left Eugene on their regular southern flight at the usual hour Wednesday morning and they reported at Medford on time. After they left that city for the north nothing was heard from them until late Thursday afternoon, after other observers located at the Eugene base had spent several hours searching for them. The men were first discovered by a forest lookout near Clyde.

Don Davis, whose home is at Nyssa, has been prominent in student activities at the university, and his friends were considerably worried when the rumor that he was lost first reached the Oregon campus. He is spending the summer working for the forest air patrol in order to make money to attend school again next fall.
