Interesting Radcliffe Chautauqua at Nyssa, August 2, 3 and 4

America's Khaki Covered College Will Tell Story of Americanization

The Radcliffe Chautauqua will be at Nyssa August 2, 3 and 4, and it promises to surpass anything of the kind ever before held in the city. Those who attend will hear musical programs rich in quality and endless variety, by both native and foreign musicians. They will be entertained with readers, impersonators and humorists who possess the art to delight and amuse without resort to slapsticks and buffoonry.

A meeting of the Chautauqua guarantors was held at the council rooms Monday, July 19, to arrange the details for holding the Chautauqua at this place on August 2, 3 and 4. W. S. Clure, chairman, presided.

Reports of committees were heard and various matters necessary to the success of the Chautauqua were discussed and appropriate action taken. A committee to make settlement with the Chautauqua company was appointed as follows: E. E. Wilson, C. C. Cotton and S. D. Goshert.

The Chautauqua program will begin each afternoon at 3:00 o'clock and evening at 8:00 o'clock. Tickets to the afternoon performance will be 50c for adults and 25c for children; for the evening program admission will be 75c for adults and 25c for children; season tickets, \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for high school (children).

The committees are working hard to make the affair a success and the sale of season tickets indicates that the people are going to support it in a liberal manner.
