### NYSSA'S GROWTH

The population of Nyssa, as shown by the census, is 563, and is about what it was expected the count would disclose. In this respect we do not share in the disappointment of those towns which, in their haste to become cities, made fictitious estimates and boosted their populations, on paper, a third or more. There can be but one result when the count is made—they fall with a dull thud.

Nyssa's growth during the past decade is far greater than the figures indicate. The 1910 census was taken in the midst of an ill-advised boom, when the town was full of near-transients who left immediately after it became known that the High Line irrigation project had been delayed. This loss of population had to be made up by a slow growth as the surrounding country developed. This loss has been made good and nearly 150 added to the total. But what is still better, the country has developed to such an extent that it will support a town much larger than Nyssa is at present, so the growth of the town in the future is sure to be rapid.

Ten years ago the 6000 acres under the Shoestring canal was a sagebrush wilderness, supporting only a mixed population of coyotes, jackrabbits, gophers and ground squirrels. Today it is all in cultivation and alone will support a town as large as Nyssa is. Kingman Colony has developed during that time into a heavy producer and several thousand acres have been reclaimed by smaller pumping plants. The Apple Valley country is developing rapidly and the big 8000-acre K. S. & D. ranch will soon be divided into small holdings. The Nyssa-Arcadia drainage system has reclaimed almost 2000 acres. By this it can be seen that the irrigated area in the vicinity of Nyssa has more than doubled since 1910 and that the town has not kept up with the growth of the country, therefore it behooves the Commercial Club to keep alive and draw the attention of the big world without to the opportunities at Nyssa that are at present wasting their fragrance on the desert air.

Nyssa should be a much larger town than the census shows it to be, even without the thousands of acres that will be reclaimed when the Owyhee and Black Canyon lands are watered. But when this great work is accomplished Nyssa, strategically situated between the two, will grow rapidly until its population reaches into the thousands, and will become the Queen City of the great Snake Valley. Keep your eye on Nyssa.
