## CAPTURE SLAYERS OF UMATILLA SHERIFF

All Five Men Who Escaped Are Now Back in Pendleton Jail.

Pendleton.—Neil Hart, Jim Owens, Jack Rathie, Louis Anderson and Richard Patterson, the five men who escaped from the jail here Sunday, July 25, after Sheriff T. H. Taylor had been murdered, were captured and are back in the Pendleton jail.

Neil Hart, alleged slayer of T. H. Taylor, sheriff of Umatilla county, and Jim Owens, Hart's principal accomplice in the jailbreak, were taken at a sheep camp in the high mountains of Union county, six miles south of Toll Gate, near the head of the Umatilla river.

The capture was made at about 1 o'clock in the morning. The posse, headed by J. H. McLachlin of La Grande, stumbled onto a shepherd's tent in the mountain section near Toll Gate, found the two men asleep and captured them without a fight.

Rathie was taken on the road two miles above Gibson on the Umatilla river. Rathie was unarmed and was resting on a hillside when he was closed in on by a posse of six men. Richard Patterson and Lewis Anderson, the last two of the fugitive outlaws, were taken into custody four miles southeast of Kamela by John McCardan and Barney Devlin, sheep herders, both of Heppner.

For a time Saturday night it looked as though the jail would be stormed by a mob determined to take the law into themselves and lynch Neil Hart, Jim Owens and Jack Rathie, the principals in the jail break, but they were dissuaded from their purpose by W. R. ("Inks") Taylor, brother of T. H. Taylor, and his successor as sheriff.

## CHARGE ATTEMPT TO STAMPEDE CLOTHIERS

Washington.—Howard E. Figg, special assistant to the attorney general in the enforcement of the Lever law against profiteering, charged that manufacturers and jobbers of wearing apparel were attempting through carefully prepared propaganda "to stampede retailers and the public into a renewed fictitious demand" for clothing, and thereby force prices higher.

"The department of justice," said Mr. Figg, "is fully advised of the several phases of this carefully planned campaign, and it only remains to fix personal responsibility before applying the criminal provisions of the Lever act."

Manufacturers and jobbers are even going to the length of "guaranteeing the retail trade against a declining market," Mr. Figg said. He called attention to instances where mills have been closed for the reason, he charged, of justifying market conditions on the plea of under-production.

## WOOL CONSUMPTION DROPS

Curtailment in Operations of Textile Industries Blamed.

Washington.—A sharp drop in wool consumption amounting to approximately 17,000,000 pounds in June as compared with the average consumption for the preceding months of this year, was announced by the department of agriculture's bureau of markets. The drop was due, the bureau said, to the curtailment of operations in the textile manufacturing industry resulting from lack of orders, cancellations and deferred shipments. Reports to the bureau show that 46,000,000 pounds of wool entered into manufacture in June against 72,700,000 pounds in January, 63,700,000 pounds in February, 67,900,000 pounds in March, 46,900,000 pounds in April and 58,600,000 pounds in May. In June, 1919, the consumption was 55,000,000 pounds.

President Wilson to Sell His Sheep. Washington.—President Wilson is to retire from the sheep business. The White House flock of 48 prize sheep, which has kept the lawns cut for three summers, is to be sold. The yield of wool has gone to charity, this year to the Salvation Army. In 1918 the flock produced 98 pounds, which was sold by the Red Cross, bringing more than \$52,000.

Bolsheviks Penetrate Armenia. Constantinople.—Bolshevik penetration of Armenia is continuing, according to advices.
