A fine field of red clover was examined and a meeting held at which the possibilities of red clover was discussed under the able leadership of Messrs. Fry and Brumbach. Great interest was manifested in the crop, for it offers the best foundation for a profitable and successful short rotation for diversified farming that can be had. Mr. Fry told of his long experience in growing the crop and discussed its value from the standpoint of increased fertility of the soil and its place in the rotation. He told of production methods from seedling to harvest. Mr. Brumbach gave figures on yields of hay and seed which proved that the crop had been far more profitable than alfalfa to those who have grown it intelligently.

where it is evident that fully 50 per cent of the alfalfa fields have given way to these crops.

At the Tensen Ray corner a short time was devoted to the examination of three possibilities to take the place of some of the alfalfa. These were ensilage corn, irrigated pasture and red clover. At the Gibson-Groot ranches, ensilage corn came in for further attention and discussion took place in the exceptionally fine field on Mr. Groot's place. Then further substitutes were examined on the Gibson farm in the shape of potatoes and onions and production methods discussed. Along the road the many fields of barley and wheat and corn for grain and seed were to be seen, suggesting still further opportunity for diversified farming.
