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K. S. & D. TO BE WATERED AND SOLD

The 3000-acre farm known as the K. S. & D. ranch, and comprising some of the choicest land between Ontario and Nyssa, will be subdivided and placed on the market in the near future, according to Fred W. Keisel, one of the owners. A contract was let to Clyde Bingham of the Ontario Concrete Pipe Company, for the manufacture and laying of irrigation pipe to cover the entire acreage with adequate water. A contract was also let to the same concern for the installation of pumps on Snake river to cover a portion of the land. It will cost \$50,000 to place the land in shape to be sold as irrigable, and the contracts call for completion of the work by November 15. Since the death of Fred J. Keisel, the owner of the property, two years ago, plans have been made to dispose of the property. Fred W. Keisel, the present owner, lives in Sacramento. The land has been newly surveyed and all arrangements made to have it listed and placed to sell in tracts of about 40 acres each. At present about 700 acres of the place are under cultivation, water being obtained from the Owyhee ditch. Under the new plan the Owyhee ditch will cover some 2200 acres of the farm, while the balance will be served by a pumping system located on the Snake river. The land lies between the river and the school house at Arcadia, about three miles north of Nyssa. The larger portion of the land lies east of the railway. The land now in cultivation lies along the Owyhee ditch, and has been known as the K. S. & H. ranch ever since the Owyhee ditch was constructed. The block of Owyhee ditch stock belonging to the farm has caused considerable trouble in stockholders' meetings, since it was so large that the voting power was often able to control the meetings. The new land to be irrigated will afford them for some 50 more families in the section tributary to Nyssa, and together with the present irrigated portion of the ranch will aid greatly in increasing the wealth of the county.
