RAILROADS GRANTED INCREASE IN RATES

Advance on Freight and Pas-
sengers Will Amount to
Billion and a Half.

Washington.—Authority for the rail-
roads to increase revenues by approx-
imately one billion and a half dollars
was granted by the interstate com-
merce commission. Freight rates will
be advanced about one-third, passen-
ger fares one-fifth and Pullman charge
one-half.

The new rates, to continue until
March 1, 1922, will become effective
on five days' notice by the carriers to
the commission and the public and
they must be in operation before Janu-
ary 1. Since the government guaran-
tee expires September 1, the carriers
are expected to put the advances into
effect by then.

The increases are designed to ef-
fect the \$600,000,000 wage advance
awarded by the railroad labor board
to provide the 6 per cent net income
on the aggregate value of the railroad
properties under the transportation
act.

The 20 per cent increase in passen-
ger fares, excess baggage charges and
milk transportation rates and the 50
per cent surcharge on Pullman fares
will be general. Freight rate increases
will vary according to territory, with
40 per cent in the east, 35 per cent
in the south, 35 per cent in the west—
from the Mississippi river to the
Rocky mountains—and 25 per cent in
mountain-Pacific territory—from east
of the Rockies to the Pacific coast.

WHEAT DROPS TO NEAR \$2 MARK

Chicago.—For the first time in more
than two years, wheat futures on the
Chicago board of trade were near the
\$2 mark Saturday.

A drop of 10 cents in December
wheat brought the total drop for the
week to 45 cents and put the price at
\$2.15. March wheat followed Decem-
ber closely, the final bid being \$2.12.
The drop in wheat was the feature
of the week on the board of trade, but
there was little sensational in its ac-
complishment. There was simply no
buyers, and sellers daily lowered the
figure at which they would part from
their holding.

Corn and oats dropped in sympathy
with wheat, but to a lesser extent.
For the week the losses in corn were:
July, 20 cents; September, 17 cents;
December, 17 cents. July oats dropped
9 1/2 cents; September and December
7 cents each.

DROP IN FLOUR PRICES

Portland Reduction Amounts to 11 per
Cent; Seattle 20 per Cent.

Portland, Or.—Flouring mills in
Portland announced a drop of 80 cents
a barrel on all grades of flour, to take
effect at once.

The lower price is the direct result
of the tendency of the wheat market
toward a lower level and the bumper
crops that are being brought in
throughout the grain belt. The re-
duction in Portland is about 11 per
cent.

Seattle prices dropped approxima-
tely 20 per cent, according to an an-
nouncement made by the Puget sound
mills.

Wholesale prices now effective on
the local market are: Family patent,
\$12.95 barrel (56 pounds net weight);
bakers, \$12.95; whole wheat, \$11.04;
valley flour, \$11.20, and straight,
\$10.80 per barrel.

Ex-Governor Hanly of Indiana Killed.
Dennison, O.—J. Frank Hanly, ex-
governor of Indiana, a prohibition
candidate for president in 1916, and
Dr. and Mrs. C. M. Baker of Kilgore,
O., were killed six miles from here
when a Pennsylvania freight train
struck their automobile.

G. A. R. Encampment Sept. 19-25.
Columbus, O.—September 19-25 are
the dates of the national encampment
of the Grand Army of the Republic to
be held at Indianapolis this year. It
was announced here by Joseph W.
O'Neill, adjutant general.

Debs Says He Will Stay in Prison.
Washington.—Eugene V. Debs, So-
cialist candidate for president, who
is now confined in the federal prison
at Atlanta, has urged his friends and
followers throughout the country to
make no further attempts to have
him freed unless all other political
prisoners are released, simultaneously.

Treasurer of N. P. Railroad Is Dead.
St. Paul, Minn.—Charles A. Clark,
treasurer of the Northern Pacific rail-
road since 1897, died of pneumonia at
a hospital where he had undergone an
operation for stomach trouble.

U. S. POPULATION IS PUT AT 105,000,000

Estimate Is Based on the
Population of Cities Al-
ready Announced.

Washington.—The population of con-
tinental United States is estimated at
105,000,000 by J. A. Hill, chief statis-
tician for the census bureau. His calcu-
lation is based on the combined popu-
lations of 1404 cities and towns for
which statistics have been announced.

The increase over 1910 is placed at
about 15,000,000, showing the growth
of the country has not kept pace with
previous decades. Almost complete
cessation of immigration during the
war is the chief reason assigned for
the falling off in growth. Other sug-
gestions were the two influenza epi-
demics, return of aliens to their native
lands and deaths of soldiers abroad
and at home during the war.

The aggregate population of the
cities and towns on which the esti-
mate was made is 41,029,354. This is
an average gain of 38 per cent, com-
pared with 35 per cent in the previous
decade.

HARDING URGED TO SPEAK IN THE WEST

Washington.—Plans of Senator
Harding, republican presidential candi-
date, to conduct a "front porch" cam-
paign are opposed by some senators
and other republican leaders from the
west. These leaders think he should
make at least one "swing around the
circle" with speeches in the principal
cities of the west, so as to come in
closer personal touch with the voters
there.

Under Senator Harding's present
plans, he will spend virtually all his
time between now and the election at
his home in Marion, O., speaking to
delegations from various parts of the
country who visit him.

URGES WAR ON RATS

Surgeon-General Warner Dangles of
Bubonic Plague.

Washington.—Calling attention to
the discovery of bubonic plague in sev-
eral American and Mexican gulf ports
and renewing his warning regarding
the introduction of the plague from
Mediterranean ports which are known
to be infected, Surgeon-General Hugh
S. Cumming urged communities
throughout the country and especially
along the coast, to inaugurate rat ex-
termination campaigns.

"The extermination of rats also is
to be desired because of the tremen-
dous economic damage they cause,"
said General Cumming.

According to conservative estimates
by the public health service based on
numerous surveys, there is at least
one rat for every person in the United
States. The same authorities say it
costs the United States \$180,000,000 a
year to support its rat population.

Kansas Fighting the I. W. W.
Topeka, Kan.—Charging that the
I. W. W. advocates acts in violation
of the Kansas anti-syndicalism law,
an injunction suit was filed in the dis-
trict court at Eldorado, asking that
the I. W. W. be enjoined permanently
from maintaining an organization in
Kansas.

Colby Floor Leader.
San Francisco, Cal.—Bainbridge Col-
by, co-sponsor of state, has been elected
as floor leader for the administration
forces at the democratic convention.
He also is a delegate from the District
of Columbia and comes as one of
President Wilson's spokesmen.

Ontario Drug on Market.
Washington.—Ontario have become a
drug on the market for the first time
in years, the department of agriculture
reports in its weekly market review.
On the other hand, potatoes are two or
three times as high as a year ago and
comparatively scarce.

2200 Drown on Seishavik Vessel.
London.—Two thousand British,
Austrian, German and Finnish prison-
ers of war were drowned when a Bol-
shevik steamer was sunk recently in the
Neva river, according to a Hel-
singfors dispatch to the Central News.

Democratic Wets From Penn. Seaten.
San Francisco.—The Pennsylvania
delegation defeated a motion to in-
struct its members of the resolutions
committee to vote for a wet plank in
the Democratic platform.

Naval Forces Wreck Dardanelles.
Constantinople.—Allied military and
naval forces have completed destruc-
tion of all fortifications on both sides
of the Dardanelles, in accordance with
the terms of the peace treaty, it was of-
ficially announced.
