MARKETING OF HAY CROP CONSIDERED BY FARMERS

As a result of a series of meetings planned by the Farm Bureau marketing committee which have been held in the various communities which produce alfalfa hay for the market, there is a growing sentiment in favor of the erection of alfalfameal mills. Committees have been appointed to investigate and organize this development in several of the communities and are now finding out the sentiment of the hay growers and attending to other details of preliminary nature.

The manufacture of alfalfa meal seems to provide the best solution for marketing this year's hay crop, wherever mills can be installed with sufficient tonnage about them to guarantee plenty of business. Looking to the future, many of the farmers intend to increase the number of dairy cows kept, as well as other livestock. There is also a general sentiment in favor of decreasing the acreage of alfalfa by growing more grain, corn, clover seed, potatoes and other crops that go with diversified farming.

With the prospective development of irrigated land now in sight there will be need of equipment for making hay which must be grown on the new land into the most marketable form, which with the hay which will be grown on the older lands for maintaining fertility, business would seem to be assured seem to be assured for a number of mills. Increased livestock and diversified farming is also desirable in order to bring the better class of lands into the highest form of production and stabilize the business of the community.
