Discover That Nyssa Is in Oregon

So 125 Portland Business Men Are Coming to Look Us Over—Will Arrive at 6 A. M., October 19.

As was announced, Al Lax, a Nyssa man, is to have the privilege of entertaining a large party of Portland business men on the 19th of this month and preparations are being made to give them a reception that will impress them with Nyssa's present and future importance. It will be a rare opportunity for Nyssa people to get acquainted with the leading men of the state and to make them acquainted with Nyssa, which is of even greater importance.

Flour for Ford Employees

One hundred barrels of flour will be the daily output of the Henry Ford grist mill, Dearborn, Michigan, before the end of September, if the rapid progress which is being made continues uninterrupted. At present it is planned to sell the flour in the employees' commissary stores. With the wheat grown on the Ford farm, the mill will complete a "from farm to consumer" link. No one outside the Ford organization touches the product.

The flour will be milled as efficiently as modern equipment can do it. Carried into the mill on a belt from the elevator alongside the building, the grain is given a final cleaning treatment before being cracked and graded. A number of bolting machines separate the white flour from the chaff and bran, and the finished product is then stored untouched by hands.

At the present time, there are three Ford Commissary Stores: One located at the Ford factory, one at the Ford Blast Furnace and Coke Ovens, and one at the Fordson Tractor Plant. Groceries, Meat, Clothing, Shoes, and Drugs are sold at cost to all Ford workers.

Ed Christenson, manager of the Bluebird Poultry farm, is constructing a modern chicken house on the company's acreage near the railroad bridge. The building will be 40x12 feet, and Ed says it is to be the last word in hen comfort, with bay windows, sleeping porches, indoor dust baths and built-in trap nests.

"There were many speakers present who told what great possibilities were in store for this country if the project was carried out. The meeting consisted of New Plymouth, Emmett, Notus, Payette and Fruitland people. The speeches were interesting and instructive. Mr. Reese from Emmett made the first speech, outlining the work and plans. He made it clear for all who heard him. Dr. Drysdale, Willard Detrick, and Roy White all of New Plymouth made very interesting talks about the work and support of New Plymouth. Mr. Newport chairman of Board of Directors made a talk in regard to the support of the movement.

Guy Mains talked of the storage water obtained from the Payette river and it was clearly shown that there was plenty for all time to come. Mr. Babbs of Notus, Mr. Wood of Payette, and Mr. Wayne, of Fruitland also made good talks.

"In all the meeting was a mixed crowd. It was evident that every town and community was willing to pull together and do all in their power to push the project through. The directors of the Black Canyon gave their support heartily and everyone who attended the meeting went away feeling encouraged over the prospects.
