Ada county has a woman candidate for the legislature, Mrs. B. S. Howe.

Investments for September, by the state department of public investments, amounted to \$781,723.25.

Prune shipping has been completed from the orchards in the vicinity of Caldwell. Exporting of prunes is in progress.

More than 100 carloads of apples packed at the Apple Valley packing house at Parma this year will be exported to England.

The new \$100,000 structure for the First National bank at Rigby is nearing completion. When finished it will eclipse anything in this line north of Pocatello.

Regional and county Sunday schools will hold a convention in Boise October 29 and 30. This meeting is one of several to be held in the towns of southern Idaho.

The Pocatello high school and the Idaho Technical Institute will be increased as to the vocational and home economics work being offered within the next few weeks.

Federal officials, in co-operation with the Boise police department, seized opium valued at approximately \$1200 and a quantity of yen-shuee in a raid on a Chinese store at Boise.

Beet digging for the Beetgrowers' Sugar company at Rigby is in full blast and deliveries are being made to the twenty-five beet landing stations the company has established this year.

The special election held recently in Jerome county for a \$250,000 bond issue to complete road work failed by lack of a two-thirds majority. The vote stood 351 for the bond issue and 312 against it.

The Intermountain district of the Lutheran church closed an interesting conference at Boise on October 5, and will meet in Idaho Falls for the 1921 conference. At that time a pastoral retreat will be held.

Ashton's tourist park was used by more than 1200 tourists during the park season just closed, according to figures compiled by the Ashton Commercial club, under whose auspices the camp was managed this year.

Jean, the 14-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Keane of Pocatello, was severely scalded when a scalding of hot water fell off the stove upon her. Physicians say that the child has good chances for recovery.

The first state golf tournament in the history of Idaho was held in Boise last week. Arthur Kahl, a member of the Boise Golf club, won the state championship cup. Golin Ofori, also of the Boise Golf club, was runner up.

Twin Falls clearing house reports total clearings for September, \$5,867, \$14.08, an increase of \$1,403,863.31 over the aggregate for August, and the largest in the history of the association, which was organized last May.

Matthew Phelps Fifield, 90 years of age, one of the few men to whom the discovery of gold in California was credited before it became generally known, and one of the oldest men in Power county, died at Rockland, October 4.

At a public meeting at Grace the second troop of cavalry for Bannock county was given a good start. Several young men signed up, and it is thought that the required number of fifty-five will soon be obtained in that vicinity.

George E. Donnan, state supervisor of agricultural education, has expressed himself as being greatly pleased with the results of the first annual livestock judging contest for the high schools of southern Idaho, held at the state fair.

Several grocery stores in Caldwell are displaying in their windows products that are grown on farms surrounding the city. One store has the front window decorated with Idaho succatash, squash, cantaloupe, pickles and watermelons, with a trimming around the outer edge of grapes.

B. P. Cope of Pingree has been awarded a contract for drilling the bedrock tests for the American Falls reservoir dam, and will begin work immediately, expecting to finish by the first of January. These tests will extend for several hundred feet on either side of the proposed site.

The St. Anthony Commercial club has issued a call for a convention to be made up of representative business clubs and organizations from Pocatello to Ashton, to be held at St. Anthony for two days, October 20th and 21st, to form a co-operative association for the purpose of promoting the interests of that section of the state.

Fran Moore of the extension department of the state university has announced a series of one-day schools throughout the state for poultry instruction. These will begin first in the western part of the state and then gradually work eastward to Pocatello and Bear Lake county.

The story comes from Warren that Robert Carey fought and killed a 3-year-old black bear with a four-pound ax. After he hit the bear with the ax, it took the ax from him, but by using a pole he got the ax back and put the bear out of action.
