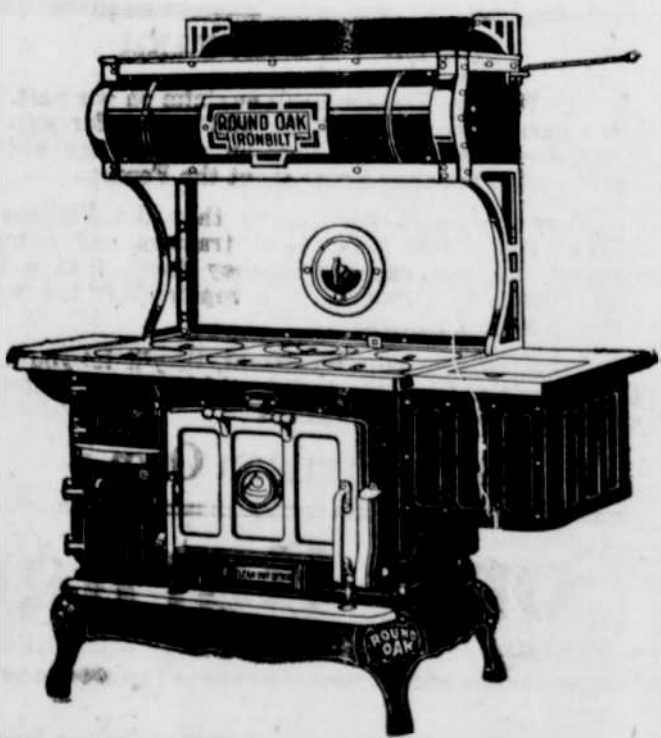

REMARKABLE

Mrs. Robinson tells that her brother (Theodore Roosevelt) shortly before he died, gave his unqualified approval to the Lodge reservations, which he thought absolutely essential to the maintenance and preservation of American sovereignty," says an editorial in the Portland Telegram.

What a remarkable occurrence! Theodore Roosevelt died January 6, 1919.

The Paris conference had not yet met. There was then no league covenant for which Mr. Lodge could frame reservations.

January 18, 1919, 12 days after Mr. Roosevelt's death, the Paris peace conference, which framed the league covenant met for the first time.

July 10, 1919, six months and four days after Mr. Roosevelt's death, President Wilson submitted the formal league covenant to congress.

September 14, 1919, eight months and six days after Mr. Roosevelt's death, the first Lodge reservation was presented in the senate.

It is indeed, remarkable that, though many months in his grave, Mr. Roosevelt was present in the flesh and gave his "unqualified approval to the Lodge reservations."

FARM BUREAU WILL HOLD A SERIES OF MEETINGS

For the purpose of discussing and taking action on securing dairy cattle and other livestock, forming a cow testing association, gopher control, reduction of the alfalfa acreage and increasing the acreage of clover, corn, wheat, potatoes and other crops, securing seed and other matters of community importance, the County Executive Committee of the Farm Bureau has recommended a series of meetings in the different communities interested.

The first of these meetings will be held at Cairo on Wednesday evening, October 20. On Thursday evening the Oregon Slope bureau will meet and on Friday the Nyssa bureau will meet at the Methodist church in Nyssa. The Vale bureau will meet on Saturday evening at the Court rooms. A definite date for the Adrian and Riverdale bureaus will be announced by cards to the members as soon as Chairman Pillsbury and Chairman Patch determine on a day, but the meetings will likely occur during the middle of the week, October 24-30.

INVESTIGATING THE MATTER OF POISONING CROWS

E. R. Kalmback, economic ornithologist with the Biological Survey who has been doing investigations work with poisoning crows in cooperation with the Malheur County Farm Bureau for the past few weeks, took his departure for Oklahoma last Saturday to continue his investigations there. The people of that section had become rather insistent that some attention be given them and as the result there will be equal benefit in Malheur. Mr. Kalmback thought he could just as well go there to continue the work.

The poisoning of crows is virgin work, as nothing of the kind has ever been done. Kalmback made considerable progress in working out an effective bait and thinks that he

will be able to solve the problem with a little more time. He found that strychnine acts too quickly and most of the birds take warning immediately when a few become sick.

He tried out various kinds of slow acting poisons to overcome this difficulty, both on captive birds and in the field, but did not succeed with any for one cause or another. He then tried corn soaked with strychnine and coated with paraffine to delay action. This worked fine on captive birds and he therefore prepared three pecks of the poison by hand and placed it on an island in the river. The result was quite encouraging, some 300 crows being killed. However, the action was not delayed quite long enough to get best results. By working the thing out carefully, Mr. Kalmback believes that it will very likely be possible to make a cleanout of crows during the winter when food is not so plentiful.
