IN THE GEM STATE

Organization of Pythian Sisters with forty-eight charter members has been effected at Rupert.

Caldwell's new \$75,000 vaudeville and moving picture theatre was formally opened last week.

Potato growers in the Burley district are begging for refrigerator cars in which to ship their product.

Merchants of Buhl have decided to close their stores at 6 p. m. on week days and 9 p. m. on Saturdays during the winter.

At Montpelier the Waterloo mine of a phosphate company is employing thirty men and shipping 100 tons of high-grade rock a day.

The ornamental poles and lights for Nampa have arrived, but the installation has been delayed by the failure of the cable to reach the city.

Alfalfa weevil is known to occur in 22 counties in Idaho but in only 10 of them has it become abundant enough to cause serious injury.

Grand encampment L. O. O. F. met at Caldwell last week with about 100 in attendance. Rebekah assembly also convened with about 250 present.

Moving picture representatives recently spent a week in the Ashton country looking for a suitable location to stage James Oliver Curwood's northern story picture play.

In the interest of Idaho farmers, Senator Nugent has sent a telegram to President Wilson urging that an embargo be placed at once on wheat shipments from Canada into this country.

The joint teachers' institute for Blinnock, Bear Lake, Bingham, Butte, Caribou, Custer, Franklin, Oneida and Power counties was opened at Pocatello, October 18, with over 700 teachers present.

Sam Bogard, 52 years old, was found dead in his cabin near Idaho City. He was lying on the floor by a stove, with some kindling in one hand, when found by a neighbor, who had stopped at the cabin to visit him.

L. Remus and Charles Mason, while trapping up in Greenhorn canyon, discovered a cinnamon bear and two cubs. They bagged the mother and captured the two youngsters and took them to Hailey. The old bear weighed 310 pounds.

W. J. Hall, commissioner of public works of the state of Idaho, was made defendant in a mandamus action filed in district court at Boise for the purpose of compelling him to open the books of his department for public inspection.

According to plans instituted by President Frazier and the faculty of the Idaho technical institute, at Pocatello, that institution will ask for nearly a half-million dollars for maintenance and improvements for the next biennium.

Luther Kirk, a farmer, is under arrest at Rupert, charged with shooting J. Merrill also a farmer as the result of a quarrel recently. Merrill is said to have been shot three times, two bullets entering his back and the third penetrating his lungs.

That the business of the O. E. L. railroad at Montpelier, has greatly outgrown its facilities is indicated by the fact that three additional sidings now are under construction in the south end of the yards. Each of these sidings will be one mile long.

Former Governor James H. Hawley has just completed a history of the state of Idaho, which will be one of his final literary efforts. The history of the state is brought down to April 1, 1919, and covers the participation of this state in the great World war.

Idaho has harvested the largest spring wheat crop in its history—15,456,000 bushels. Combined with the 5,000,000 bushels of winter wheat, Idaho's total wheat production for 1920 is placed at 21,354,000 bushels, as compared with 18,705,000 bushels last year.

James M. Burnett, of Blackfoot, while hunting with a party of friends on Wet creek, in the Pahsimeroi country, last week, accidentally shot himself in the right foot with a .32-calibre revolver. Burnett, who was alone at the time, cauterized the wound with a burning match and then extricated the bullet.

The public utilities commission has denied the application made by Robert C. Brown of the Gooding Waterworks company for an order authorizing him to abandon the water service to some twenty-six customers in the Woodworth addition to the city of Gooding, claiming that the service was being rendered at a loss.

A verdict of guilty was returned against Charles McKelvey, Charles Warren, E. J. Bates, Randolph Lehman and Emmet Donahue, charged under federal statute with using force and violence to obstruct the free use and occupancy of public lands. This is an outcome of the Custer county range war a year ago which resulted in the shooting of Pete Iphor.

Eight inches of snow, falling on trees with leaves still on them, caused the loss of many of the old trees of Pocatello, including many in the city parks, at the Idaho Technical Institute campus and along the streets.

Horseshoe Bend is enjoying quite a degree of prosperity as the expectant capital of Boise county. Town lots are changing hands and some good buildings are promised.

A 17-year-old Chinese youth is being sought by Boise officers. It became known that he stole \$500 from an uncle who had befriended him.

Nyssa Boy Marries in Alberta, Canada

Ora W. Harris, well known in Nyssa, where he spent his boyhood, was married at Calgary, Alberta, on November 1, to Miss Harriet Leopold of Clarishpin, Alberta. The young people passed through Nyssa Tuesday evening on their way to Nampa to visit a sister of Mr. Harris. They will come to Nyssa in a few days to spend the winter, and in the spring will return to Alberta, where Mr. Harris is associated with his grandfather in farming an 800-acre ranch.
