IN THE GEM STATE

Jerome's community orchestra was revived at a meeting last week.

Business men of Wilder met last week and organized the Business Men's association of Wilder.

The state meeting of the secretaries of Commercial clubs will be held at Caldwell from November 23 to 24.

The annual Idaho Sunday School association convention was held at Caldwell, Sunday and Monday of last week.

The municipal employment office at Boise during October found work for 206 persons, 25 more than were placed during September.

Archie Young, negro, 35 years of age, dropped dead on the depot platform at Green River, Wyo., while waiting for a train.

A Caldwell resident has launched a scheme for a frugal laundry, where poor families can do their laundry work with all modern conveniences.

A sad feature of the opening of the pleasant season was the death of Virgil Trout of Sandoval, Ill., who accidentally shot himself near Meridian.

Former students and educators of Kansas, who are now doing either educational or public work in Idaho, were entertained at a banquet at Twin Falls.

The public school at Rupert reopened on November 2, after being closed for a week to allow the teachers to attend the institute at Twin Falls.

Ninetyseven building permits for building and alterations amounting to \$211,450, were issued through the building inspector's office at Boise during October.

Members of the M. E. church of Kimberly, and others have just completed a successful drive in a "shower of blessings" for the benefit of the Gooding college at Gooding.

Joe Miller and Harry Flattery were arrested at Pocatello on advices from Sheriff Whitaker of Evanston, Wyo. The men will be held here until an officer arrives from Wyoming.

A loss of 10 per cent in the potato crop is estimated as the result of last week's storm in the Rupert section. In regard to hay, it is thought that the loss will not be more than 6 per cent.

The Armistice day football game to be played at Boise between the University of Utah and the University of Idaho will be the first intercollegiate football game in the history of the city.

The accidental discharge of his shotgun, as he was climbing into a machine, three miles west of Meridian, caused the death of Virgil Trout, who with two friends was hunting pheasants.

Kid Davis, intermountain featherweight champion, lost a decision in 12 rounds at Pocatello with Spig Myers. Davis does not lose the championship on this fight, because Myers weighed 130 pounds, ringside.

Work on the Cascade-Knox road will be suspended for the winter. About 15 miles of the road have been completed, this amount costing about \$34,000. Five miles of this road consist of expensive rock work.

As a result of too much "moonshine" on the part of election crowds, the cooks and waiters' hall at Idaho Falls was turned into a free-for-all fight. Catsup bottles, glasses and finally water pipes were used as weapons.

The following shipments have been made from Homedale: 26 cars of prunes, averaging 1386 boxes to the car; 15 cars of apples, averaging 756 boxes to the car; 3 sacks of potatoes, averaging 406 weeks to the car; 25 cars of grain.

Sportsmen of Gem county have filed a petition with the state game warden asking that the season on pheasants be cut down to two weeks instead of the full month. They ask that this be done to prevent the game from being annihilated.

One of the interesting issues that will go before the next legislature is the question of the removal of the county seat of Boise county from Idaho City to Horseshoe Bend. If this is done practically the oldest city in the state will virtually be abandoned.

The first carload of head lettuce shipped from Wilder brought \$1200 on the Chicago market, it is said. Part of this shipment was docked on account of being colored by rain after crating. A large number of farmers will grow head lettuce next year, it is announced.

The winter semester opened at the Idaho Technical institute at Pocatello on November 1 with a large increase in enrollment. The earliness of the snow, preventing many farmers from getting their beets and other crops harvested, will keep many farm boys out of school for two weeks yet.

Roy Benson was accidentally shot in the knees by Ora Roselle at Humphrey. Roselle was shooting ducks over the O. S. L. ice pond, and at the time was standing in a wagon. His horses started up, and in trying to stop them the gun was discharged, making a serious wound in Benson's knees.

Frankie Regan, the Pueblo light-weight, who has been boxing in Idaho for some time, has been suspended by the state athletic commission for a period of six months, beginning October 20. He is suspended for his refusal to carry out his contract with the Gate City Athletic club at Idaho Falls to box George Solita.

John Kaneister of Hagerman, a student at the Idaho Technical institute at Pocatello, narrowly escaped death or serious injury at the college shops, when an emery wheel he was using broke and three pieces hit him.

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
