First Unit Black Canyon Under Way

Work on the first unit of the Black Canyon irrigation is progressing rapidly, says the New Plymouth sentinel. Surveyors of the reclamation service are now at work on the Payette river, making surveys, looking to the irrigation of the lands within the Black Canyon district which are on the Payette and Boise river slopes. Competent engineers estimate that 30,000 acres of the Boise slope can be irrigated by a gravity ditch from the Black Canyon dam, together with a large area of land on the Payette slope. The first unit of the project, embracing an area of approximately 9,000 acres of land will have water delivered upon it early enough for crops next year. The entire project embraces an area of something like 90,000 acres of as fertile land as is to be found in the West and it is believed that its other units will be reclaimed by the federal government with the least possible delay.
