Complete History of the Past Week Told in Paragraphs—Prepared for the Busy Reader

INTERMOUNTAIN.

The age-old story of wine, woman and song, is the story of the downfall of Arthur H. W. Cayhuc, who faces a sentence of from three to five years in prison for embezzlement of \$10,000. He was sentenced Wednesday at Denver.

Governor Robert D. Carey of Wyoming is reported to have declared in a telegram to Senator James D. Phelan of California that it is time for "United States and other nations to call Japan's bluff."

John Doughty was arrested at Oregon City, Ore., on information that he was wanted in Toronto, Canada, in connection with the kidnapping of Ambrose Joseph Small and the alleged theft of \$100,000 in bonds. Doughty was employed in an Oregon City paper mill.

Four New York city stenographers have arrived at Tacoma after hiking across the continent. The girls walked the distance except for occasional lifts from motorists and farmers.

Yee Gow, Chinese murderer at jail at Cheyenne, broke his hunger strike of six days when he ate a hearty meal. At the conclusion of his feat he begged for more food, but was refused. Gow killed two white men several weeks ago.

Representatives of the Western Pacific railroad bought the properties of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad at foreclosure sale at Denver. The sale price was \$5,000,000 cash. The purchasers also agreed to assume \$141,175,000 obligations of the Rio Grande.

DOMESTIC.

The Citizens State bank of Coalgate, Okla., was closed following discovery of an alleged shortage of more than \$300,000 in the bank's funds.

It is announced that John D. Rockefeller has provided \$63,763,357 towards the Laura Spellman Rockefeller memorial, established in memory of his wife, who died in 1915. The announcement also revealed that Mr. Rockefeller's total benefactions have reached the enormous total of close to half a billion dollars.

Although officially the beer stein and the mug of ale are a thing of the past, not so with pretzels, by-product of the brewer. One hundred and one million pretzels were turned out by St. Louis baking companies during the past year.

Additional reinforcements arrived at Miami, Fla., from Key West early Thursday to aid the crew of sub-chaser 154 in guarding employees of the Western Union Telegraph company and to prevent them from connecting the cables across Biscayne bay between Miami and Miami beach.

One ton of grain, vegetables and fruits for each of the 107,000,000 inhabitants of the United States is the response of farmers to the popular appeal of the country for more and cheaper food, reports to the agricultural department indicate.

Douglas Cruikshank flirted with a middle-aged woman on an L. train at Chicago. Later he discovered she was the wife he deserted fourteen years ago. Now he is paying \$10 a week back alimony to her and their daughter.

Bandits escaped with \$75,000 worth of liquor when they robbed the Harders warehouse at Chicago. The watchman was bound.

The bolshevist government will do ainate every inch of Russia and then it will collapse, according to Dr. E. A. Lutik, a Russian physician and formerly a Near East relief worker, who has just arrived at New York.

President-elect Harding will stop at Vera Cruz en route to the United States from Panama, unless unforeseen circumstances prevent.

Normal Williams and Marie Williams, alias West, were arrested at Wheeling, W. Va., in connection with the alleged murder of Henry T. Pierce, wealthy Philadelphia merchant. The girl said Williams killed Pierce and that she and three men were in the house at the time, police say.

James ("Hippo") Vaughn, a star pitcher with the Chicago Nationals, and rated as one of the greatest left-handers in the major leagues, is in a hospital at Kenosha, Wis., as a result of being slashed with a razor by his father-in-law during a quarrel.

Senator Knox of Pennsylvania has let it be known that he planned to reintroduce at the approaching session of congress his resolution to declare a state of peace with Germany.

The First State bank of Polytechnic, suburb of Fort Worth, Texas, was held up at noon Tuesday by bandits and robbed of \$5500. The bandits escaped in an automobile.

Investigation of alleged practices of corporal punishments in the Chicago Heights school has been begun by the state department of public welfare.

Frederick R. Copperfield of Cleveland and Miss Bernice Rose are under arrest at Los Angeles on a charge of fleeing Mrs. S. Coleman, an aged widow, out of \$49,900 in an oil stock scheme.

Senator and Mrs. Warren G. Harding observed Thanksgiving quietly at Ancon, C. Z. Although gray skies may have prevailed over much of the United States, a scorching tropical sun bathed Ancon, the Pacific terminus of the Panama canal, while the president-elect had dinner.

"The country will live to regret what it has done in the recent election," Thomas R. Marshall, vice president of the United States, declared in an address at a railway station at Dallas, Texas. "It is the greatest in justice of a century and will bring one of the world's greatest figures to an untimely grave," the speaker said.

"Mike de Pike" Heitler and thirty others, alleged members of the largest booze ring operating in the country were indicted by the federal grand jury at Chicago on charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws.

WASHINGTON.

The United States has been invited by the council of the league of nations to negotiate between Armenia and Mustapha Kemal, leader of the Turkish nationalists, who is invading that country. It was stated that, if accepted, no mandatory obligations would be incurred by the United States.

Among the goodies which decorated the table of President Wilson on Thanksgiving day were many presents received from over the country. One of the two turkeys was served. Other presents included: Apples from Oregon and Maryland; pecan nuts from Louisiana; great bunches of celery and a dozen partridges.

That a number of messages may be sent over submarine cables simultaneously through the use of alternating currents and that the trunks of growing trees may be utilized at times in the place of sending and receiving antenna for radio apparatus was disclosed by experiments conducted in the research laboratories of the army signal corps during the past year.

Horatio Blanco Fombona, held a prisoner by the American military authorities in San Domingo, has started a hunger strike, according to word received here. Fombona is a newspaper man and has gained considerable fame as a poet.

FOREIGN.

All Britain has been startled by the charges made by Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, that the Sinn Feiners had plotted to blow up the Liverpool docks and the Manchester power and water plants.

Government terms of 20 per cent increase in wages have been accepted by striking miners in the Coalhula, Mexico, coal regions and the men have returned to work.

The bakers of Madrid have declared a general strike. Measures have been taken to prevent disturbances.

Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, minister at Windsor, Ont., charged with "killing and slaying" Beverly Tremble, has been remanded under bail of \$20,000 until December 2, when he will appear to answer to the charge.

Suppression of the blockade in Russia is favored by Premier Laygues, he told the committee on foreign relations of the chamber of deputies. Inasmuch as the soviet government is actually in operation, he declared, it has been decided to permit French traders and manufacturers to do all the business they can with Russia.

Steps for the immediate establishment of peace in Ireland were urged in the house of commons on Wednesday by former Premier Asquith, supported by labor members.

Eleven aluminum German airplanes sold to an American concern and loaded on a ship in Hamburg, have been ordered held up by the inter-allied aeronautical commission, which alleges a violation of the Versailles treaty. It is officially announced at Berlin.

The last remnants of the troops of General Petura, the Ukrainian leader, have crossed the Ukrainian frontier into Poland and have been disarmed by Polish troops.

Great Britain has already taken steps to inform former King Constantine of Greece and George Rhaillis, the new Greek premier, that she is absolutely opposed to the return of Constantine to the Greek throne, says the Petit Parisien.

One hundred eminent persons, among them Crown Princess Cecilie, Prince Eitel Frederick, Prince August Wilhelm, the late Prince Joachim, Count Radolin and Princess Wanda Radziwill, have smuggled to Holland money aggregating 250,000,000 marks, asserted Hermann Mueller, former German chancellor, in the reichstag.

The American Red Cross, in answer to an appeal by the French authorities, has instructed the Red Cross in Constantinople to use all that may be necessary of the 20,000,000 francs stock of supplies there for the Crimean refugees.

Seven persons were killed and thirty wounded in a conflict between Socialists and anti-Socialists at the first meeting of the new municipal council at Bologna, Italy.

A resolution presented by M. Rene Viviani, inviting the council of the league of nations to confer with the various powers with the view of constituting a force sufficient to put an end to hostilities in Armenia, was joined to Lord Robert Cecil's resolution along the same lines, was adopted by the assembly of the league at Geneva on November 22.

Negotiations looking to a permanent peace between soviet Russian and Poland have been broken off by the former at Riga, where the delegations have been in conference.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

The tenderloin of beef is considered a great dainty, but unless it is cooked with good seasoning it is insipid and unpalatable.

Larded Beef Tenderloin With Bananas.—For larding use a strip of salt pork near the rind. Cut the pork in narrow strips one-fourth of an inch thick and one-fourth of an inch wide, as long as possible. Chill the larders in ice water and draw them into the beef with a larding needle, inserting them in rows. Sear the meat until the meat is browned on all sides, then leave to cool on the larded side. Baste six or more times while roasting, season with salt, pepper, bits of onion, green pepper, garlic or parsley as one's taste dictates. When the meat is cooked surround with small cooked bananas and pour over the bananas two cupsful of Polvrade sauce. The bananas may be baked in the pan with the roast or in a separate saucepan. Cook them about twenty minutes.

Polvrade Sauce.—Put two tablespoonfuls of the trimmings from the salt pork into a saucepan and cook slowly until the fat is drawn out. Add two slices of onion, five slices of carrot, two sprigs of parsley, a bit of bay leaf and a slice of green pepper. Let cool until all are softened and yellowed. Drain off the fat, add one-fourth of a cupful of vinegar and let stand on the back of the stove until the vinegar is reduced one-half. To the fat drained from the vegetables add butter to make four tablespoonfuls. When hot add four tablespoonfuls of flour and let cool until slightly brown, then add one and one-half cupsful of brown stock and stir until boiling. Add the vegetables and vinegar, boil up once, then strain over one-half cupful of sultana raisins cooked tender in boiling water; finish with three tablespoonfuls of grape juice and the same of currant jelly.

Peach Sherbet.—Boil one quart of water and two cupfuls of sugar 15 minutes; let cool and add one and one-half cupfuls of peach pulp and juice and the juice of one lemon. Freeze as usual.

EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS.

There are few people who can resist a piece of nicely baked corn bread.

Country Corn Bread.—Sift together three-quarters of a cupful of cornmeal, half a cupful of flour, one-quarter of a cupful of sugar and half a teaspoonful each of soda and salt. Beat one egg, add one cupful of thick sour milk—butter-milk is better, or, still better, sour cream—and three tablespoonfuls of shortening, melted; stir into the dry ingredients and bake in a shallow pan 25 minutes.

Delicate Muffins.—Sift together one and one-half cupfuls of flour (pastry), two and one-half tablespoonfuls of granulated cornmeal, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, half a teaspoonful of salt and one-third of a cupful of sugar; add three-quarters of a cupful of milk and three tablespoonfuls of melted butter; mix thoroughly and bake in hot, well-buttered muffin tins 25 minutes.

Cream Cheese Salad.—This may be made with any variety of soft cheese. To two cream cheeses add two tablespoonfuls of cream, one pimento, 24 olives and half a cupful of blanched almonds—the ingredients are chopped very fine and separately; mix all together thoroughly with a wooden spoon; press into a mold lined with paraffin paper. When firm and chilled, unmold and cut in slices. Serve on crisp heart leaves of lettuce with French dressing.

Stuffed Veal Cutlets.—Pound a thin slice of veal to one-eighth of an inch in thickness, cut in pieces three by five inches. Add one-half pound of chopped veal, one slice of bacon, chopped; one-half cupful of bread crumbs, softened in milk and squeezed dry, one teaspoonful of onion juice, one teaspoonful of salt, paprika to taste, a half cupful of chopped mushroom stems. Mix and spread on the strips of veal, roll and fasten with wooden toothpicks and saute in hot salt pork fat. Put into a casserole, add stock (hot) or milk, peas, potato balls, carrot balls, mushroom caps from one-half pound of mushrooms. The vegetables except the mushrooms should be parboiled and cooked in fat until slightly colored before adding to the casserole. The mushrooms should be cooked in butter five minutes before adding. Add a little flour blended with some of the milk or stock and cook in the oven until the vegetables are tender. Serve from the casserole.
