OLIVE SAUCE—Melt four tablespoons of butter and a teaspoonful of chopped olives, and cook until softened. Remove the olives, add five tablespoons of flour and a half-teaspoonful of salt with a few dashes of pepper; add two cups of brown stock and cook until thick. Cut one dozen olives from the pits, cover with boiling water for five minutes, drain and add to the sauce. Serve with meat or game.

HAWAIIAN SALAD—Place a slice of pineapple on a leaf of lettuce. On it arrange alternate sections of orange and grapefruit. Between each piece place one-eighth section of a ripe olive. In the center of the pineapple place a ball made of cream cheese seasoned with mayonnaise, to hold it together. Sprinkle with paprika and serve with French dressing. The pineapple or other fruit juices may be used in place of the vinegar in the dressing. Pass mayonnaise for the salad.

OLIVE SALAD—Take four tart apples, one stalk of celery, or rather bunch, one-half cupful of walnut meats and three-fourths of a cupful of pitted olives, ripe. Cut the celery, apples and olives into julienne strips. Add the nuts, moisten with mayonnaise and serve in a nest of lettuce.

The Kitchen Cabinet

The woman who undertakes the administration of a home without understanding it is on a par with a man who establishes a home without being able to support it.

SIMPLE DISHES.

A dessert which is new and most wholesome is found in the following:

Butterscotch Pudding.—Melt one cupful of brown sugar and two tablespoonfuls of butter over the fire and cook until melted and brown, but not burned. Pour over the mixture two cupfuls of hot milk and simmer ten minutes until all is dissolved. Meanwhile soak a one-inch slice of bread in cold water until soft, press out all the water and crumble into bits. Pour the milk, sugar and butter mixture over the bread and beat in the yolks of two eggs, a little salt and a small teaspoonful of vanilla. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a pan of water twenty-five minutes. Beat the whites of the eggs until stiff, add two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, the juice of half a lemon, beat again. Spread over the pudding and brown in a moderate oven.

Apple Cake.—Line a deep pie plate with pastry. Mix together one-half cupful each of raisins and nuts, three-quarters of a cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of cinnamon and sprinkle over the crust. On top of this arrange three green apples, sliced rather thin. Pour over the apples one cupful of milk mixed with one egg; sprinkle the whole with two tablespoonfuls of sugar and a little more cinnamon and dot with bits of butter. Bake 45 minutes in a slow oven, reducing the heat toward the last.

Fried Apples and Onions.—Heat the frying pan, add one-third of a cupful of meat drippings and when hot turn in two points of sliced onions; cook gently adding one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt, and two tablespoonfuls of sugar; after ten minutes of cooking add three points of quartered tart apples. Cover and cook until the apples are tender. Serve hot as a garnish for broiled pork chops.

Cranberry Jelly.—Take one quart of cranberries, one pint of sugar and one cupful of water. Cook the berries in the water five or ten minutes, covered. When well broken with a pestle press the pulp through a strainer, a perforated one, not wire; stir in the sugar and when well mixed pour into a large mold or individual molds. Let stand until the next day.

Apple Sandwich.—Chop one large apple, add one-third of a cupful of raisins very fine. Butter thin slices of bread, spread with the mixture, sprinkle with a little lemon juice and cover with other slices.

GOOD CARE OF ALL IMPLEMENTS WILL SAVE MANY REPAIR BILLS



Leaving Implements to the Mercy of the Weather Costs Money.

In this day of complicated machinery most farmers probably give little thought to the care of so simple an implement as a plow. But more effort has been expended in the slow process of developing this seemingly simple tool than in that of any other implement on the farm. It is the basic tillage tool, the fundamental farm implement, and it is richly entitled to be properly cared for when not in use.

Store in Dry Place.

When laid by, say the implement experts, the plow should, if possible, be stored in a dry place, away from contact with the ground. In any case, the bright parts should always be coated with grease to prevent rust. Once the mold board and share have become pitted with rust, an efficient job of plowing cannot be done until the corroded parts again have acquired a polish by use.

The United States Department of Agriculture, of course, does not stop with the plow in its admonition in this regard. Harrows, also relatively simple but tremendously important implements, are, next to plows, most generally neglected. Many farmers who would not neglect an expensive harvesting machine, say the experts, are careless as to harrows and other implements of this type. But these also represent capital invested, and a larger return is possible if they are properly cared for at the end of the season.

If harrows are stored under a shed the teeth should be supported by blocks or boards, so that they will not become embedded in the ground. All accumulations of earth and trash should be removed. This is especially applicable to wooden-frame harrows. The earthy accumulations retain moisture and accelerate decay. When the wooden parts have dried out sufficiently they should be painted, to prevent season checking and splitting. As the harrow works in wet earth and close to the ground, deterioration is rapid once checking has started.

If the disk harrow is stored in a shed or other floorless building, the disk gangs should be run upon boards, so the disks will not become embedded in the ground. Whether housed or not, the implement should be carefully cleaned of all accumulations of soil, and the disks should be greased with a heavy grease to prevent rust. The

CO-OPERATION PAYS FARMERS

Formation of Society in Prentiss County, Miss., Follows Efforts of County Agent.

Co-operative marketing of all kinds of farm produce has been successfully worked out in Prentiss county, Miss. Buyers formerly went into the county and purchased at their own prices, often 25 per cent below the outside market. The county agent of the United States Department of Agriculture succeeded in getting the farmers to load a car of corn, each farmer's contribution being weighed separately and a record kept by one of the banks. The car netted 25 cents a bushel over previous prices, and the local market rate arose 25 cents as a consequence.

A co-operative shipment of hogs follows, and after several successful experiences the Farmers' Co-operative association of Prentiss county, Miss., was organized and a regular marketing agent employed. This organization did a business of more than \$250,000 in 12 months, at prices considerably in advance of those formerly realized. Deposits in two local banks were more than doubled in two years.

LAND PLASTER VERY USEFUL

Tends to Preserve Nitrogen of Manure Rather Than Expel It—Good Stable Deodorant.

Land plaster, gypsum, or calcium sulphate should not be confused with lime, though it is similar in the respect that it carries the element calcium. Unlike lime, gypsum will not correct acidity, but it has the advantage of changing ammonium carbonate, which is volatile, into the stable form of ammonium sulphate. For this reason it is exceptionally useful as a deodorant and absorbent in stables. It tends to preserve the nitrogen of manure rather than to expel it, as do burned and hydrated lime, and therefore it is quite generally recommended as a preservative for poultry manure as well as other sorts.

LESPEDEZA OF GREAT VALUE

One of the Most Valuable Forage Crops for the Southeastern Part of the United States.

Lespedeza, also commonly known as Japan clover, is one of the most valuable forage crops for the southeastern part of the United States. Except on alluvial bottom lands, it rarely makes sufficient growth to justify being cut for hay; nevertheless its wide-spread adaptation to grazing conditions gives it a value that is difficult to estimate. Being a legume, it is valuable for soil improvement, and also it is relished by all classes of live stock. The United States Department of Agriculture has a new Farmers' Bulletin No. 1143, on lespedeza as a forage crop.

Another Royal Suggestion

3-Egg Angel and Sunshine Cakes

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

An Angel cake that is fairly melts in your mouth. Instead of eight eggs it can be made with three and the yolks of the eggs can be used for a Royal Sunshine cake.

Angel Cake

1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups flour
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cup scalded milk
1 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract
whites of 3 eggs

Mix and sift first five ingredients four times. Add milk very slowly, while still hot, beating continuously; add vanilla; mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until light. Turn into ungreased angel cake tin and bake in very slow oven about 45 minutes. Remove from oven; invert pan and allow to stand until cold. Cover top and sides with either white or chocolate icing.

Sunshine Cake

3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup sugar
Yolks of 3 eggs
1 teaspoon flavoring extract
1/4 cup milk
1 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, and yolks of eggs which have been beaten until thick; add flavoring; sift together flour and baking powder and add alternately, a little at a time, with the milk to first mixture. Bake in greased loaf pan in moderate oven 35 to 45 minutes. Cover with white icing.
