## FEDERATION COMPLETE

President V. V. Hickox of the County Farm Bureau received a telegram Tuesday from Geo. A. Mansfield, president of the Oregon State Farm Bureau asking him to forward Malheur County's application and membership dues in the State Federation, saying that it would complete the necessary number of counties to make the organization permanent. A farm Bureau voucher check accompanied by the application went forth immediately.

By linking up with the State Federation, and the State Federation with the National Federation, Malheur County will become a cog in the great Farm Bureau organization which has grown up as if by magic within the past ten months. Already there is a membership of over 1,500,000 and this number is expected to double before long. The organization is adopting business principles in its work, some of the brightest men in the country serving as officers and committeemen. A sample of its methods can be found in the employment of such men as Clifford Thorne to head its Bureau of Transportation.

## COLD WEATHER WARNING

## TO NYSSA MOTORISTS

## Many Reasons for Insomnia.

Loss of sleep may be due to some physical thorn such as an overburdened intestine or stomach, an abscessed tooth root, thickened tonsil, a skin irritated or cold, or an infection in some hidden, walled-off area of the anatomy. Equally as often some unconscious memory of financial reverses or difficulties, domestic complications or some other work business sleep.

## Signs of Consumption.

What are the early symptoms? The patient may have neither cough nor expectoration. He feels tired in the afternoon, and wakes tired in the morning. His appetite is poor, and he begins to lose weight or to stop growing. He is easily exhausted after exercise. Anyone who notices these symptoms in himself should consult a doctor. In any family, rich or poor, in which one member is known to have consumption, all the others should be examined by specialists.
