History of Past Week

The News Happenings of Seven Days Paraphrased

INTERMOUNTAIN.

Seven thousand dollars in gold and \$1000 in currency was taken by daylight safe robbers from the vault and strong box of the Western Loan and Building company at Salt Lake.

All records for the number of bills introduced in the Colorado Legislature have been shattered. On January 21, a total of 1100 bills had been introduced.

It will be a misdemeanor for an aviator to alight on a public highway in Oregon, except in an emergency, under the terms of a bill introduced in the state legislature, creating a state board of aircraft examiners and regulating the licensing of aviators.

A stringent anti-alien land bill, modeled after the California law, has been introduced in the Oregon legislature. Before being presented, the attorney general decided that the provisions of the measure were fully within the constitutional powers of the legislature.

Under the terms of the will of Henry D. Watson, of Kearney, Neb., \$250,000 is bequeathed to the state of Colorado to be used as a loan fund for struggling Colorado ranchers. Watson, who was a rancher, was actuated by a desire to help others who had no financial backing.

A complete canvass of the mining companies operating at Butte, Mont., shows that 7000 persons are employed in the industry in that district. This includes miners, surface workers and office help.

DOMESTIC.

The power of taxation in this country now is being exercised to an extent almost of destruction, Governor Miller told the Bar association of the state of New York at its annual meeting at New York.

Charged with defrauding the government and hiring a man to set fire to government buildings, Franklin L. Lamm, former quartermaster at Ft. Wayne, was arrested by federal authorities at Detroit.

District Attorney Charles F. Cline has announced a new blow to knock the yeast out of home brew at Chicago. Hereafter, according to Mr. Cline, the landlord of any tenant making home brew will be fined \$1000.

Investigation of complaints that wholesale poultry dealers have combined to keep prices high by creating an artificial scarcity has been started at New York by federal and state authorities.

Don A. Stephenson of Sheffield, Ala., prohibition enforcement officer, was killed, two other members of the force were seriously wounded and three are missing as a result of a battle with alleged moonshiners.

Four men and a woman, believed to have been responsible for more than thirty fur robberies during the last two months, involving loot between \$200,000 and \$350,000, have been arrested in Chicago.

Nearly a year's effort by Ludwig C. A. K. Martens to gain recognition by the United States government as the ambassador to the Russian soviet government ended Saturday with his departure for Gothenburg, Sweden, on board the steamship Stockholm.

The first free meals to be served to unemployed men of Toledo on January 21, were taken advantage of by more than 1200 applicants, it was announced at the Social Service federation, which is giving 1500 tickets.

Wilbur J. Willis, 27, who in the World war passed unscathed through three great drives, including the Argonne campaign, was killed at his home in Council Hill, Ill., when a tree he chopped down fell on him.

Virtually all of the \$185,000 obtained in the theft of thirty-one packages of registered mail at Mount Vernon, Ill., a few days ago, has been recovered by postoffice inspectors in several raids.

Dangling from a thirty-foot rope held by laborers, Dr. Donnelly, of Forham hospital, New York, administered first aid to three men pinned under an automobile truck that had plunged over a rock embankment on the outskirts of the city. The men were rescued later and will probably recover.

G. C. Tompkins has been convicted at Hoidaysburg, Pa., of the killing of Mrs. Edmund Humphries, on July 15, 1917. It was the fourth trial for Humphries, who was an automobile racer, and the fourth conviction. Efforts were made to prove that he was insane at the time he killed Mrs. Humphries.

Wallace Ringle, a senior in the Pittsburg high school and business manager of the high school paper, killed himself by poisoning at Pittsburg, Kans. He was arrested Thursday, charged with holding up a store clerk and confessed that and other offenses, the police said.

Arthur Cox reported to the police at Mexico, Mo., that four negroes kidnapped him at night, took him in a horse-drawn vehicle a number of miles into the country, and severely beat him. His left wrist was broken and his face lacerated badly.

A standing reward of \$500 to any person for the death of each bandit killed while attempting to rob a member bank was voted Friday by the Association of Suburban bankers at Kansas City.

An appropriation of \$250,000 for the relief of needy unemployed has been voted by the Detroit city council. Applications for relief average about 200 daily.

A vote of 1637 to 24 favoring private ownership and operation of street railroad lines is recorded in a referendum proposition submitted to its members by the United States chamber of commerce.

Single standard of morals for men and women, with punishment alike for both, is the object of a bill drafted by the legislative committee of the Iowa Christian Temperance Union. Efforts will be made to get the bill through at the present session of the legislature.

WASHINGTON.

The question of total or partial disarmament should not be discussed by the United States with other nations pending a change of administrations, March 4, Elihu Root, who helped to form the international court of arbitration under the league of nations, declared in a letter to Chairman Butler of the house naval committee.

Staggering burdens of taxation resulting from the world war have caused the people of all nations to favor a world agreement for disarmament, Henry White, former ambassador to France, and a member of the American peace commission to Paris, declared before the house naval committee holding hearings on this subject.

Deportation of Gregory Weinstein, chancellor of the Russian soviet bureau in the United States, has been ordered by Secretary Wilson of the labor department.

W. M. Coleman of New York, general counsel for the Hudson & Manhattan railroad company, committed suicide by jumping from the eleventh story of a hotel at Washington.

FOREIGN.

A serious outbreak, involving the looting of country markets, has occurred in the Muzafferpur district, British India. Sympathizers with the non-cooperative movement are believed to have been principals or instigators.

According to a Belgrade dispatch, the Serbian chief rabbi at Alkalai has left for the United States. It is understood he has been entrusted with a special mission by the Serbian government.

Recommendation that the Mexican government pay indemnities for damages sustained by individuals and companies during revolutionary periods in this country will be made to the Mexican congress by President Obregon.

Immediate evacuation of Siberia, universal suffrage and insistence upon Japan's rights in the California question were demanded in resolutions passed at a general meeting of the Kenseikai, the opposition party of Japan.

Eight men, seven of whom were constables, were shot and killed in engagements with Sinn Feiners near Dublin, Friday. Six of the constables met death when their motor car ran into an ambush.

A loan of \$30,000,000 has been negotiated by the Belgian government with the Guaranty Trust company of New York, and the contract for it was signed a few days ago. The loan will be issued in the United States and bears interest at 8 per cent.

Gutierrez's standing army of 15,000 men is to be cut to 5,000, according to news that comes from that country.

The next session of the league of nations will be held in Geneva, February 21. Several commissions will be appointed by the council to report at the assembly in September next.

America was given a prominent place in Aristide Briand's enunciation of his plans as premier of France. Presenting his cabinet slate to the chamber of deputies, the new premier declared France respected America's hesitancy at entering the league of nations. He also expressed his confidence in the future relations of the two countries.

President Obregon of Mexico, in answering newspaper men's inquiries on reports that he intended to make Mexico dry, ordered drinks for the reporters and said: "The only vice I recognize is that of excess."

More than 100 persons were injured and more than 200 others were drowned in the disaster at Pachuca, Mexico, when two dams above the city broke and torrents of water swept through the lower sections of this big mining center, according to the latest reports. A thousand persons were rendered homeless. The property damage will be enormous.

British troops are being withdrawn gradually from Mesopotamia, according to an authoritative statement in London official circles. The districts are fast becoming normal and as this occurs the troops are being taken away.

The Portuguese newspapers have undertaken a campaign to prevent the continued emigration of Portuguese citizens to the United States and Brazil by pointing out that more than 2,000,000 workers are idle and hundreds of factories closed in the United States and that the Portuguese are not welcome in Brazil.

Three persons were drowned and seventeen injured when approximately 100 passengers were thrown into the bay at Rio Janeiro by the collapse of a gangplank being used by passengers boarding a steamer.

No. 1 alfalfa, Kansas City \$25, Memphis \$23, Chicago \$25. No. 1 prairie—Chicago \$17.50, Minneapolis \$15, Kansas City \$14.

Mill feed market dull and slightly lower. Demand is for immediate shipment only. Principal manufacturers have reduced price of gluten feed \$3. Cottonseed meal about \$1 lower in several markets. Supplies more than adequate to fill inquiries.

Quote: Bran \$25.50, \$23, flour middlings \$27, Minneapolis; linseed meal \$33.50 Buffalo, \$39 Minneapolis; 36 per cent cottonseed meal \$22.50 Memphis. Sacked yellow onions declined slightly f. o. b., reaching \$50@51 per 100 lbs.; middlewestern cities ranged 50¢@51.35 Jan. 20th. Eastern market slightly lower at \$1@1.60.

Corn.—Although there have been heavy export sales of wheat throughout the week, Chicago March wheat is 12¢ lower, week ago. May corn 6¢. In Chicago cash market on the 21st No. 2 red winter wheat 17¢@22¢; No. 2 hard wheat 17¢@22¢; No. 3 yellow corn 5¢@6¢; under May; No. 3 mixed 5¢@6¢; under. Minneapolis reports a better demand with cash No. 2 dark northern selling 16¢@18¢ over Minneapolis March. In Kansas City No. 2 hard wheat 4½¢@7½¢ over Kansas City March. For the week Minneapolis March wheat lost 18½¢, closing at \$1.55; Kansas City March 13½¢ at \$1.58½¢; Winnipeg May 14½¢, at \$1.81½¢. Chicago March wheat 11¢@14¢; May wheat 11½¢@14¢; May corn 67½¢.

Live Stock and Meats.—With the exception of veal calves, all important classes of live stock at Chicago showed declines during the past week. Hogs lost 20¢@30¢; beef steers \$1@1.50; butcher cattle 10¢@20¢; feeder steers generally 50¢. Veal calves showed a net advance of 50¢ per 100 lbs. Fat calves declined 75¢@1.75. Heavy lambs losing most. Fat ewes broke 25¢@50¢; yearling wethers 50¢@75¢. Jan. 21st Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales \$9.25@9.50; medium and good beef steers \$7.75@9.00; butcher cows and heifers \$4.50@6; feeder cows \$3.50@4.50; calves \$10.50@12.50; fat lambs \$8.50@11; feeding lambs \$5.25@10.25; yearlings \$7.50@9.25; fat calves \$2.75@6.4.

Dairy Products.—Weakness characterized but markets throughout the week, and declines have occurred in all markets. Tone of markets now easy. Receivers are free sellers and prices often shaded rather than to lose a sale. The large cargo of Danish butter which arrived on the 20th at New York now available, prices asked, \$4½¢@5¢ and as high as 5¢ on small lots. Unsettled tone of markets due largely to foreign butter from Denmark, Argentina and New Zealand. Production of domestic also seems to be increasing. Prices at New York: Butter, 1 lb. Chicago 46¢; Philadelphia 51½¢; Boston 52¢.

Cheese markets maintained firm tone and although business is temporarily dull in some markets the feeling is one of confidence.

Industrial Peace Plan Proposed.—Sacramento.—Senator Duncan has introduced an "industrial peace act," which, he said, has the approval of both labor representatives and employers. The bill proposes to create a tribunal in which both employer and employees shall have a part, but in which the public shall have the controlling voice. This tribunal would have power to compel attendance of witnesses and production of books and records.

Mayor Aids Unemployed.—Revere, Mass.—Besieged by jobless, who begin to gather about the city hall steps at 6 a. m., regardless of the sharp weather, Mayor T. A. Noone has practically turned his office into an employment bureau.

Snowfall in Southern California.—Los Angeles.—Snow fell in the Hollywood and Elysian park sections of Los Angeles Saturday for the first time in several years. The tops of street cars returning to the downtown districts from Hollywood were white with it.

WAS VICE PRESIDENT AT 36

John Cabell Breckenridge of Kentucky the Youngest Man Ever to Hold the High Office.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for vice president, was asked whether, if elected at thirty-eight, he would be the youngest vice president of the United States. He did not know, but hoped some of his friends would look the matter up.

John Cabell Breckenridge was elected vice president on the Democratic ticket with James Buchanan in 1856. He assumed office March 4, 1857, when he was thirty-six years, one month and fourteen days old. When Breckenridge completed his term he was candidate for President as representative of the slave-holding interests, but was defeated by Lincoln. The same year he was elected to the United States senate, but soon afterward joined the Confederate army. From January to April, 1865, he was secretary of war in the cabinet of Jeff Davis. He died in Lexington, Ky., May 17, 1875.
