NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That the County dog tax for the year 1921 is now due and payable to the County Clerk, as follows:

Males or spayed females.....\$1.00 each  
Females.....\$2.00 each

"Any owner or keeper of a dog or dogs who shall fail to apply for, or fail to pay said license fee, shall pay a fine of \$10.00 for each offense" (laws of Oregon 1919, Sec. 186). This Act also provides that any dog not wearing a collar having thereon the license tax shall be considered an outlaw and shall be killed by any peace officer.

Application may be made in person or in writing, accompanied by the proper fees, and stating the length of collar desired, to the office of the County Clerk and license will be mailed to you.
