Nyssa Represented at the O. A. C.

Nyssa has one freshman representative in the school of agriculture out of the 2627 students enrolled by the college since September. The total enrollment of agricultural students is 884 as compared with 48 in 1899-90. The agricultural enrollment during the last 21 years has been from 25 to 90 per cent of the entire college enrollment.

John A. McDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McDonald, is Nyssa's freshman agricultural representative at the college. The freshman class has 163 students enrolled for the second term's work. Six members of the freshman class are federal rehabilitation men.

Slow Progress Toward City Irrigation System

Many Nyssa people who have prepared grounds for gardens and lawns with the expectation of securing water from the proposed municipal irrigation system are wondering when the water will be turned on. It is to be regretted that this improvement should be delayed. According to estimates, \$4500 will install the system, bonds for which have already been issued. Difficulty in disposing of the bonds has been encountered, which is said to be the obstacle that is preventing the immediate installation of the system. This is a condition for which the City Council does not appear to be to blame, but Nyssa people will be sadly disappointed if the irrigation system is delayed.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Senator McNary, after a conference with the Secretary of the Interior, was advised that the reclamation service would at once submit a contract and send an engineer to Oregon to investigate the Owyhee Irrigation District in Malheur county. The Oregon legislature passed a law authorizing the expenditure of \$5000 in cooperation with the United States for the development of this project.
