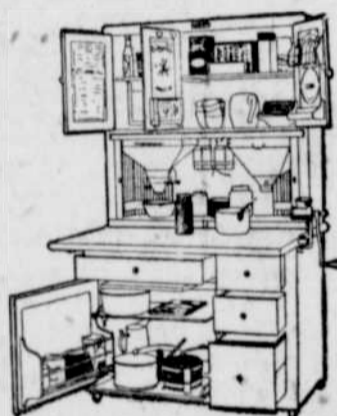

### SUGAR BEET MEETING

The farmers in the vicinity of Cairo met on Monday evening at the Grange hall to listen to a representative of the Amalgamated Sugar company who explained various points about the production of sugar beets and the contracts which the company is making with growers. At the close of the meeting several persons indicated that they were ready to grow beets provided sufficient acreage would be signed up. The company wants a minimum of 300 acres within hauling distance of one loading station before it is willing to provide the loading facilities. If there is sufficient interest in the matter, Mr. Armour, the representative of the company, said he would spend a little time here interviewing those who wished to grow beets on their farms where he could inspect the land before closing contracts.

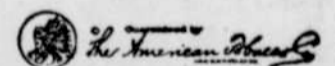
