## Teachers' Salaries

University of Oregon, July 21.—Although there are approximately six thousand public school teachers in the state of Oregon, only thirty of them receive annual salaries of three thousand dollars or more, according to figures brought out during the summer term of the University of Oregon. There are 24 teaching positions carrying salaries between twenty-five hundred and three thousand dollars a year. School room jobs throughout the state with compensation ranging between two thousand dollars and twenty-five hundred a year number only 240. These figures include Portland. All the rest of the thousands of teachers, including hundreds of superintendents, principals, and supervisors, receive less than two thousand dollars for their services, though large numbers of them have spent four years in a university, college or normal school. Several superintendents in attendance at the University summer term from the larger towns of the state report difficulty in completing their staffs for next year. There is still a shortage of teachers, they say. The number of appointment calls coming in to the appointment bureau of the University further confirm this report of a teacher scarcity.
