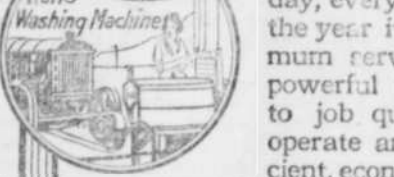
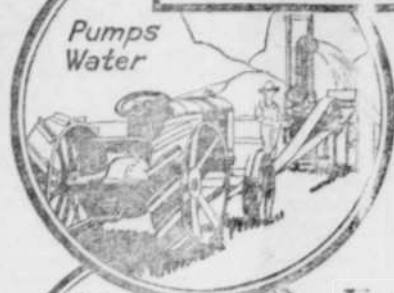

\$50,000 Par Value and Accrued Interest

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Malheur County, State of Oregon, at the County Court room in the Court house at Vale, in Malheur County, State of Oregon, on the 20th day of August, 1921, up to the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. of said day, for the sale of Fifty Thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) bonds, par value of said County in series as follows, to-wit: \$2,000.00 of series "A" to run and be payable four years from December 1st, 1919; \$2,000.00 of series "B" to run and be payable six years from December 1st, 1919; \$3,000.00 of series "C" to run and be payable eight years from December 1st, 1919; \$4,000.00 of series "D" to run and be payable ten years from December 1st, 1919; \$6,000.00 of series "E" to run and be payable twelve years from December 1st, 1919; \$7,000.00 of series "F" to run and be payable fourteen years from December 1st, 1919; \$8,000.00 of series "G" to run and be payable sixteen years from December 1st, 1919; \$8,000.00 of series "H" to run and be payable eighteen years from December 1st, 1919; \$10,000.00 of series "I" to run and be payable twenty years from December 1st, 1919.

All of said bonds to be in denominations of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and bearing interest at the rate of five and one-half per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually at the office of the County Treasurer of said County, or at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.
