Good Potato Seed Pays.

Good prices for potatoes at this time is no reason why farmers should sell all of their marketable potatoes and retain the small ones for seed. Neither should prospective growers purchase small seed with which to start in business next year. Small seed is usually the result of inferior hills, often affected by disease. Many small potatoes sorted out of the average field are undersized because of the dwarfing effect of wilt mosaic, or some other equally dangerous potato bad-dy. To plant the little potatoes from common uncertified stock is to invite a harvest proportionately small.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

Excess Feed Hurts Laying

Low production by pullets at this season is often caused by the feeding method in use. The use of moist mash now should be avoided as the layers will receive the necessary amount of protein in the dry mash ordinarily supplied. Feeding wet mash in conjunction with the dry is a good practice in summer, but in cold wet weather it does not promote exercise, while the excess protein may check laying even though the birds may show bright combs.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.
