TAX PAYERS MEET

FINANCING SCHOOL TO FINISH TERM DISCUSSED- TO VOTE ON BONDS

WITH SCHOOL BOARD

The taxpayers of school district No. 26 met Tuesday usternoon at the school house with the board of directors of the district, and discussed the matter of financing the school for the remainder of the year.

It seems that there is no market for the warrants that are now being issued, and in order to meet obligations of the school, the board can see only noe way out-that is approximately \$5000.

It in understood that the school board has, through one of the local banks, found a place where they can dispose of the bonds. It was also suggested at the meeting that the school board cut off the last month of the uchool year, and by whipping up complete the work in 8 months

and it was put to a vote of those present that the teachers be asked to consent to the change in their contracts. It seemed that nearly all were in favor of this arrange ment, and the vote carried.

The school board will meet sgain soon and arrange for a bond election, so the fear of having to close the schools before the term is finished peems to have faded away.

ip the growing of head ettuce, at Ontario on Friday, November 20, beginning at 10 A. M. Mr. E. R Bennett, who is the Edaho specialist on this line of work, and Mr. R. H. Young and Mr. Lee Johnton, both practical growers from Canyon County, have been invited to speak on various divisions of the subject The meeting will be held in the city half and it is expected that the room will be packed with farmers who are interested in getting into the head tettuce game, ut there is a great deal of interest in the proposition at present owing to the great success and large profits which have been made during the past few years by head lettuce growers in different places in Idaho. The meeting is being arranged by county agent Breithaupt in cooperation with the county farm bureau department of Truck and vegetable crops of which G. W. Lettig is chairman. Invitations have been extended to growers from adjacent counties to be present, and all farmers or others interested in the sub ject in Malheur county are invited. The program will deal mostly with

production methods. At the recent meeting on lettuce growing held in Caldwell over one thousand persons were in ettend ance. It is estimated that sufficlent acreage will be planted to make 1000 cars of the product next year to be shipped from Southern Blaho and Malheur County.
