COUNSEL WRANGLE AT NICHOLS TRIAL THUR

MURDER TRIAL AT VALE PRO-ISES TO BE LONG DRAW-OUT

Vale, Oregon, Feb. 2.—A trial today at Vale of Archie Nichols, alleged slayer of William Hicks at Jordan Valley in December, much time was consumed the acrimonious debate between counsel over the admissibility evidence of the statement alleged to have been made to District Attorney Robt. D. Lytle, by the defendant, following the death Hicks. The revolver and cartridges found on the cellar floor were finally admitted as evidence after a wealth of dreary detail had been introduced by the state witnesses. The testimony of witness was that the cellar in which Hicks met his death was conducted as a blind tiger and that all participants in the fatal affair had imbibed freely of intoxicants before the shooting occurred.

LOOKING FORWARD

If everybody in town was just like me, What kind of a town would our town be?

Friend, did you ever stop to a yourself that question? Did you ever stop to think that no town could be better than the people who make it; that every town is just what the people make it, good, bad, or merely mediocre; and that the quality of the people make the quality of the town, high and excellent, or low and degraded; a that the quality of the character of the town, intelligent and pure or ignorant and with low ideals? One evil minded individual will give any community a reputation of wrong doing that will drive away families who wish to bring their children right, and will get to that community an evil reputation that will reach to far distant communities, and will militate against it for years.

Right thinking persons will lift in a community for years without cause that is expected of a community; but the first outbreak wrong doing, such as bootlegging or the illicit manufacture of liquor will bring to that community undue attention of law officers and will result in bringing to the community the reputation of being a law-defying community.

And once more, families look for the best location in which bring up their children will be elsewhere.

Again, the violation of law is not to be continued indefinitely without finally resulting in arrest and exposure and disgrace.

Any intelligent individual owes to his community the best that in him mentally, physically and spiritually.

All growth emanates from within. Mental power comes only by the study of those subjects that make for the highest usefulness. Manhood's best comes only saving contact with divine power and by growth in the knowledge of the things of righteousness. But no person can be better than his aspirations for the rest. A no person will ever rise above his aspirations. If we are satisfied with low ideals, low grade literature, low grade thinking, we will become just that kind of an individual. Poor soil produces poor vegetation, so poor thinking produces poor no other kind of manhood or womanhood.

Amusements that are mere relaxation from hard work or that thinking may be all right; but amusement is for our good that mere indulgence in desire for pleasure. No amusement is so that merely caters to wrong suggestion. Suggestion leads to thinning along the lines of wrong doing and finally to wrong doing itself. And wrong doing leads to exposure and sure disgrace. And once more the people looking for a happy home community where they may spend their days in peace and happiness will look elsewhere for their salvation.

We are just as good as we want to be. If we wanted to be better nothing would be allowed to stand in our way. The simple fact that our town is not the finest and best town in the country is evident.

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
