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Probably the most important matter to the people of Nyssa and the farmers adjacent is the formation of an efficient agency for the disposal of the farm products of this vicinity at a fair price. With our productive soil and favorable growing conditions it is easy enough to raise the produce, but the trouble heretofore has been to dispose of it at a price that would give the producer a fair return for the labor and capital involved. This matter was discussed at considerable length at the meeting of the Commercial Club Wednesday evening and steps were taken that it is hoped will result in remedying this condition. It is proposed to hold a meeting of business men and farmers at the Commercial Club rooms next Wednesday evening to try and work out some plan for the foundation of a local selling agency for handling the various agricultural products of this section. Experience has shown that Co-operation is necessary to secure the best results in selling farm products. This was illustrated last year when a number of farmers combined and held their potatoes until they were offered reasonable prices for them. The first offer was \$1.15 per hundred and when this was refused the price kept jumping up until it reached \$2.40 per hundred, at which price the bulk of the crop was sold. Had it not been for the combine the first price undoubtedly would have been the amount received for the potatoes. All farmers of this vicinity are invited to attend a special meeting of the Nyssa Commercial Club next Wednesday evening and talk the matter over. Let's get busy and protect our own interests.

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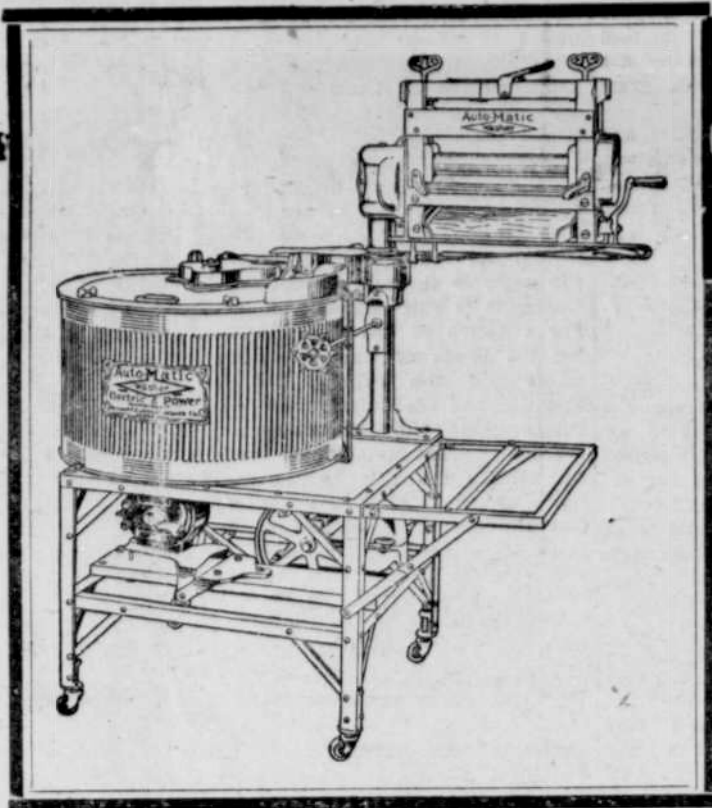
