

Tailored Suits Have the Call

Three-Piece Outfits Are in the
Limelight of Paris Fashions,
Correspondent Says.

COATS SHORT AND YOUTHFUL

Abbreviated Garments Provided to
Make Women Appear Young—
Jacket Looks Like the Blous-
ing Bodice of Dress.

The one-piece dress, like Tennyson's brook, might have gone on forever, writes a Paris fashion correspondent in the New York Tribune, had not the tailors of the world suddenly discovered that the way to secure a large part of the business going to the dress-maker was to make suits and coats with the allure of the one-piece cloth dress; that is to say, the severe lines of the tailored suit of other days must give place to soft drapery, and the strictly tailored coat, when used, must be short and youthful in appearance, for women desire, above all things, to have their clothes make them appear young. The chemise dress did this. Some of the most successful models might have made suitable frocks for little girls.

The tailored suit has been in the height of fashion since prewar days until this season. Such great fashions have tailors shown in this that it has come to pass that the three-piece suit is now the high light of fashion—a thing which no one believed would ever happen again.

Dog Collar Belt of Badger Hair.

Even O'Rosen, the tailor, of the Place Vendôme, in Paris, who made himself famous almost overnight by means of his severely tailored gray suit, has changed his tactics and is now featuring suits with short graceful jackets blousing over a low-placed waistline. He has completely forsaken gray—the color which precipitated him into the limelight—and now uses the soft sand shades. The materials which he favors are English woolsens, serges and tricotines.

It is quite remarkable how coquetish are some of the street coats for spring. Designers have obviously endeavored to make them as becoming as possible that they, too, might rival the very smart one-piece wool dress.

Typical of models of this sort is a coat developed in a brilliant brownish red cloth and trimmed with threadings of black taffeta cut in bias points. This model has the Madeleine Vionnet circular swing and cup-shaped collar standing erect. The floating ends of taffeta are quite unusual on a cloth coat.

The marked feature of another coat is its dog collar belt, exactly like that worn by the smart and much-indulged bulldog. The belt is of raspberry red and black enamel leather bordered with bristling badger hair. The coat itself, which seems almost secondary, is in a raspberry red velours de laine embroidered in black and gray.

Hip-Length Jackets in Combinations. The jackets of the new tailored suits are notably short, some in semi-fitted styles and others with full bias swinging coat just missing the curve of the

the blousing bodice of a dress. Several of these are notable for their long, tight-fitting sleeves, so long that they wrinkle in order not to cover the hands.

Tailored suits made from striped materials are very interesting in their detail, transverse stripes being used in opposition to vertical ones to work out the novelty of the design.

There is a note of red on many of the new suits, a bright Chinese red being used as an embroidery, piping or belt trimming in combination with black, with navy blue, canard beige tones and gray.

An interesting feature is the crepe de chine jacket suit, the material being treated as one would use a serge.

All of the tailored suits are shown with most charming little blouses, some of which match, notably in the trimming, and others in distinct contrast to both material and color.

Three-Piece Suits of Two Fabrics. Worth makes a specialty of crepe de chine three-piece suits, many of which have very fancy sleeves. He combines two materials, such as crepe marocain and crepe de chine. The sleeves, in addition to being very elaborate, are often much embroidered in beautiful combinations of color.

Jean Patou has created a great impression with his smart youthful lines, notably in suits and simple tailored and one-piece dresses. Practically all jackets are short and in distinct tailored style, many being belted like the Russian blouse. He uses lovely tweeds and other interesting materials in mixed grays. As a variety among jacket suits he has models with smart short capes. In nearly every instance a very attractive blouse accompanies the suit, this in itself being quite as much a feature as the suit.

Two materials are often combined; thus he shows one tailored model—Mephisto—with a white serge skirt and a red serge jacket. There is a full line of one-piece afternoon dresses in both wool and in silk. The navy blue serge dress is at its best in this collection. A lovely model called Parisienne is developed from Bianchini's Jacquard serge, which seems to have a fine thread embroidery in white thrown to the surface on the blue serge ground.

Yellows and Reds. Patou makes a complete showing of tailored suits, three-piece suits, afternoon dresses and evening gowns for jeunesse filles. He has used perfect taste and discrimination between the youthful models and mature styles.

This house also specializes in sports clothes. Patou shows blazer suits and knitted suits of jersey cloth. He is not afraid to use color, as all his sport garments are in high tones and his youthful models in suits and dresses run toward yellow and red, with strong accent on the former.

Martial et Armand is making a big feature of the woolen tailored suit with jacket and the tailored wool dress with cape or jacket, also the robe maitre, or woven street dress, having the appearance of a coat. The predominance of such models gives the impression of simplicity and practicality to the showing.

In view of the international interest in out-of-door sports for women Paris is showing her talent in designing novelties for this purpose. Every important house has given this subject some attention, and several houses boldly announce having opened special ateliers for the creation of tennis, golf and other sports wear garments. Knitted suits, coats and sweaters naturally have a large showing in this line, but with true Parisian originality and luxuriance many other interesting new things are shown for sport wear.

The Youthful Hat. "Patchwork" hats in combination of pastel or high shades, worn with the typical "dapper" tilt, are quite the rage for young girls.

NATIONAL CAPITAL AFFAIRS

New Rural Credit System for Farmers?



WASHINGTON.—President Harding's recommendation to congress of legislation providing farmers with credit facilities as favorable as those enjoyed by commerce and industry may lead to the establishment of a rural credits system entirely independent of either the federal reserve system or the federal land banks.

A new chain of banks, which would be linked up with a central corporation at Washington, to take the place of the War Finance corporation, is proposed. The system would be designed to furnish credits on agricultural products and live stock over periods ranging from six months to three years, which are not provided through the agencies which have al-

ready been established by federal legislation.

That additional rural credits facilities are needed was urged in the report of the joint commission of agricultural inquiry, headed by Representative Anderson of Minnesota. The bill introduced by him in the house and by Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin in the senate, however, providing for credits of this nature through the federal land banks is meeting criticism. Objection is made to confusing this new type of agricultural credit with the long term loans on land which are provided by the federal land banks. A strong movement appears to be developing for the establishment of an entirely independent system.

Schemes for the creation of a new system are contained in a bill recently introduced in the senate by Senator Simmons of North Carolina and also in another bill just perfected which was presented in the senate by Senator Norbeck of South Dakota and in the house by Representative King of Illinois.

The Simmons bill creates what is called the National Agricultural Credits corporation, with a life of fifty years.

U. S. Shipping Board Is Attacked Again

CONGRESSIONAL investigation of the procedure followed by the United States shipping board in the settlement of claims growing out of wartime building contracts is demanded by Stiles E. Dodge of Cleveland, a special auditor of the board, who has been making a study of conditions in some of the Pacific coast shipyards.

Mr. Dodge said he had discussed the matter with several senators and representatives and was going to fight to get all the facts placed before the public. One contention he makes is that he can show that overpayments made and contemplated on the Pacific coast involved from \$8,000,000 to \$10,000,000. He says he is prepared to go before a congressional committee and present his case.

An investigation of the circumstances surrounding the release by the shipping board on April 19 of L. M. Stevens, acting general controller, is sought by Mr. Dodge. Mr. Stevens is sought by Mr. Dodge, Mr. Stevens is from Pittsburgh, and Representative M. Clyde Kelly of Pennsylvania has written to President Harding for information concerning the removal of Stevens.

"If the conditions which Mr. Dodge describes exist," said Representative



Kelly, "the facts should be known to the public. I do not want to take snap judgment, and I am going to wait and see what explanation is made. If I am not satisfied then, I shall introduce a resolution asking for an investigation."

Mr. Dodge was with the shipping board during the war and for a time was controller for the Great Lakes district. He has not resigned his present position as a special auditor, and said today he did not intend to do so.

When the attack upon the board was called to the attention of Chairman Lasker, he said the facts would show that the actions of the present administration of the shipping board in the settlement of claims were not properly subject to audit.

"A 1922 Woman's Charter of Rights"



MISS MARY WINNOR of Philadelphia, member of the National Council of the woman's party, is drafting a "1922 Woman's charter of rights." The rights which American women have not yet won, and are now demanding, will be listed in this charter, based on the charter of rights adopted by the first woman's rights convention ever held in America, at Seneca Falls, N. Y., in 1848.

The charter of rights for Twentieth century women will resemble the 1848 document to a large extent, according to Miss Winnor, since, of all the rights claimed by those earlier women, only one—the right of suffrage—has been completely secured. Some of the resolutions in the 1848 charter, which may find a place in the new woman's Magna Carta are:

"Resolved, that all laws which pre-

vent a woman from occupying such a station in society as her conscience shall dictate, or which places her in a position inferior to that of man, are contrary to the great precept of nature and therefore of no force or authority.

"Resolved, that the women of this country ought to be enlightened in regard to the laws under which they live, that they may no longer publish their degradation by declaring themselves satisfied with their present position nor their ignorance by asserting that they have all the rights they want.

"Resolved, that the same amount of virtue, delicacy and refinement of behavior that is required of women in the social state should also be required of man, and the same transgressions should be visited with equal severity on both man and woman.

"Resolved, that the equality of human rights results necessarily from the fact of the identity of the race in capabilities and responsibilities.

"Resolved, that the speedy success of our cause depends upon the zealous and untiring efforts of both men and women for the securing to woman an equal participation with men in the various trades, professions and commerce."

Harding Favors Reclamation Projects

APPROVAL of President Harding for the McNary bill providing for creation of a \$350,000,000 revolving fund to be used for development of Western and Southern reclamation and drainage projects, was given to a congressional delegation who called at the White House.

Members of the delegation, which was headed by Senator McNary of Oregon and Representative Smith of Idaho said the President expressed deep interest in the legislation which is pending in both the senate and the house. Mr. Harding indicated, delegation members said, that he would confer with party leaders on the matter.

The President was told that there was strong support for passage of the measure at this session of congress and that enactment of the bill would result in the reclamation of millions of acres of land and provide homes for thousands of people.

A memorandum submitted by the delegation showed that under the reclamation act of 1902 approximately 3,000,000 acres of desert lands had been reclaimed, more than 40,000 families had been established on farm-



land and the national wealth had been increased approximately \$600,000,000 and foodstuffs valued at \$150,000,000 raised each year on these vast projects in 14 states—all at an expenditure by the government of approximately \$130,000,000 from the fund created from the sale of public land and from land fees of various kinds.

President Harding was said by his visitors to favor passage of the legislation during the present session. The most difficulty, it was said, was expected in the house, and the President promised to confer with members of the house Republican steering committee and urge them to press the bill at this session.
