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A MODERN SHERLOCK.

The Ontario Argus is exhibiting qualities which even its most ardent admirers have never heretofore suspected it possessed, to wit: a remarkable ability to discover what everybody else has known all the time. Such wonderful perspicacity entitles it to a niche in the hall of fame along side of our old friend Sherlock. One of its most notable discoveries, due to what it calls a slip in the Journal, is that the Journal acknowledges Ontario's assistance in securing the graveled road from Cairo to Nyssa. SUGGESTIONS ON

ALFALFA WEEVIL.

The damage to the second crop alfalfa may be lessened a great deal if the field is dusted thoroughly after the first crop is out. Many of the hay growers are cutting the crop early in the hopes of heading the weevil off. The effect of this will be to start the worms eating; on the second crop buds unless they are destroyed and the second crop will be delayed for several weeks. If the land is already dry and reasonably loose it can be dragged with a spiketooth harrow with teeth tilted back and several thick- nesses of wire fencing placed underneath, the rig being rode by the driver standing on a plank laid crosswise on top of the harrow. If the land is soddy and hard, it should be loosened with a spring- tooth harrow and then dusted. The worms are killed by being rolled in hot dust. This method has been practiced for 20 years in Utah. The objections to it is the practical loss of the first crop which should be the largest and most valuable of all, really making up about 50 per cent of the feeding value of a normal yield.

Many fields have been reduced in stand through the work of the weevil until it would seem desirable to sow something in to increase the yield of hay in the second crop. In such cases, Sudan grass is probably about the best thing to use, as it matures quicker than any other high yielding plant. About 8 pounds of seed per acre is considered a full seeding. This amount should be cut down in accordance with the amount of alfalfa. By seeding ahead of the harrowing operations and follow- ing up with irrigation no trouble should be experienced in getting a stand. Cutting might need to be delayed slightly until the Sudan grass had formed seeds in order to get the most value out of it, as the plant, like others of the sorghum and corn family forms the valuable sugars and carbohydrates during the latter stages of growth.
