### ANENT FREE SPEECH

The right of free speech and a free press, guaranteed by the United States constitution, have been abrogated in Kansas, by the industrial court law of that state upheld by the courts. It not only makes it a crime for men to strike to better their condition, but it penalizes a person for expressing sympathy for the strikers. These facts are rough to light by the arrest of William Allen White, editor of the Emporia Gazette, for placing a placard expressing sympathy for the striking shopten in the window of the Gazette office. Mr. White posted the placard after he had been informed that the attorney general had ruled it against the industrial and anti-syndicalism law. If this law is constitutional in Kansas it is constitutional in all the states and the American working man is reduced to a condition of abject slavery. And not only that, but all constitutional guarantees are swept away, for there is no constitutional provision more clearly defined than the right of free speech and a free press, and if court juggling can do away with those constitutional rights the constitution might as well be cast into the fire.

In Wednesday's Gazette Mr. White said:  
 "The order of the industrial court is an infamous infraction of the right of free press and free speech. Certainly it has not come to pass in this country that a man may not say what he thinks about an industrial controversy without disarming, cost of keeping, and all expenses incurred including Justice Fees and cost of advertising and sale, and such other costs and expenses as may have been regularly made. ### OREGON DID NOT REMEMBER.

The Enterprise is indebted this week to The Oregon Voter for reprinting an editorial written by Harvey Scott for the Oregonian in 1909. And should the entire people of this state read and heed the warning in this editorial, even now, they will be indebted to The Voter. Oregon, from the commonwealth down to the smallest political subdivision, is bond-ridden today and from the propoganda which is being scattered it is easy to see that attempts will be made at the next legislature for more bonds.

It will be well for you to read Harvey Scott's warning given 13 years ago and remember it.

It is too bad that it was not taken more seriously to mind when first published:

"It may be true, as the Troy, New York, Times remarks, in a paragraph reprinted by The Oregonian today, that Oregon, when it became a state, 'had the wisdom' to insert, in its constitution and statutes, provisions in use in New York. Some things are common in the constitutions and laws of all our states. Nevertheless, the constitution of Oregon is very nearly an exact copy of that of Indiana—we mean the second constitution of Indiana, adopted by that state in the year 1851. The first constitution of Indiana, adopted in 1816, was found later to be very crude and imperfect. It did not sufficiently guard the state against schemes and schemers; it allowed the establishment of a state bank and branches; it did not make sufficiently clear that the state was not to lend its credit for promotion of paternalistic jobs, and these jobs constantly multiplied, especially in the matter of state aid to transportation projects; the instrument was weak in its control of taxation, and in multitude of ways left too much discretion to the legislature. By sad experience, Indiana had discovered that its promoters and jobbers had put it in the hole, just as the same description of citizens of Oregon now are laboring for what they call 'the welfare of the state,' in similar lines. ### MONTHLY NEWS LETTER

#### Poison Bran Mash Is Recommended for Grasshopper Treatment.

Grasshoppers are numerous enough in some places in Malheur county to do considerable damage to crops and it is possible that the numbers of these pests will increase in cultivated lands adjacent to range country from which they may move in as feed becomes scarce. If it becomes necessary to fight hoppers to save the crops, as some are already doing, the following formula which is recommended by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Experiment Station, should be of value. Where organized action is necessary, the farm bureau director for the community should be interviewed. Assistance will be given by this office as needed.

- Wheat bran, very flaky, 100 lbs.
- White arsenic, 4 lbs.
- Molasses, cheap, 2 gallons.
- Salt, 2 lbs.
- Amyl Acetate, 3 ozs.
- Water, to moisten, 10 to 15 gals.
- Paris green, calcium arsenate, or lead arsenate may be substituted for the Amyl acetate. Mix the poison thoroughly with the dry bran, add the other ingredients to water and mix the whole thoroughly together to make a moist mash. Sow this broadcast thinly, from 5 to 10 pounds per acre. Late in the afternoon over all infested land. If the hoppers are very numerous it may be necessary to re-cover the land once or twice at intervals of two or three days.

#### Alfalfa Weevil Spray Increases Yield of First Crop and Growth of Second.

A report of the number of live alfalfa weevil larva found after the various treatments given on the Homer Utley place, was given in the last monthly letter. The yield of hay from the part sprayed on June 2 was two tons per acre of good quality; that sprayed on June 11 yielded 1.4 tons of poor quality, and that which was not sprayed made 1.1 tons of very inferior stuff. Twenty-five days after cutting, the early-sprayed hay was about knee high and doing well; the late-sprayed hay was two or three inches shorter; and that which was not sprayed was still shorter and thinner. A portion of the field which was given a double application on June 2 which showed the greatest "kill" of weevil larva when the count was made, had produced a growth very much superior to any other. The results of this demonstration seem to be quite conclusive in showing that alfalfa weevil can be controlled by spraying, provided it is properly done at the proper time. For best results it would seem that the quantity of poison used must be increased slightly or the distribution of it improved through the use of a higher pressure, than afforded by the machine used in the demonstration. The matter of properly dating the spray is, however, most important. The delay of only a few days will mean the difference between success and a failure in practical benefits.

#### Federation Wheat Looks Promising.

The demonstration tracts of Federation wheat planted in nine communities in comparison with all the leading varieties now being grown in the county, are now being harvested. This variety of spring wheat looks good. It is early, stands up well under irrigation with a medium short straw, is beardless and ranks high as a milling wheat. If the yield compares favorably with the Dicklow which is the highest
