SCHOOL LAW ARGUMENTS

Negative Argument Submitted by W. H. Body, of Hood River, Oregon; William Moll Case, of Eugene, Oregon, and Boudinot Seelye, of Portland, Oregon.

On July 12, 1922, a group of 26 Oregon ministers, members of the Presbyterian church, adopted the following statement of belief:

"Whereas, much of the propaganda in favor of this bill has been conducted in the name of Protestantism, we the undersigned ministers, members of the Presbyterian church, believe that the proposed legislation is inimical to the highest human welfare for the following reasons:

1. It proposes to abolish one system of religious education and offers no substitute for it in any plan of religious instruction in connection with the public school system.

2. It is based on the philosophy of autocracy that the child belongs primarily to the state; it is an unjustifiable invasion of family authority and threatens ultimately the guarantees of our American liberty.

3. The proposed legislation in its conception, promotion and execution violates what we conceive to be the spirit of fraternity and brotherly love taught by our Master.

At the same time we desire that it be understood that we favor the erection of standards by the state department of education for both students and teachers in all private schools.

If the flock gets the point it is adequately sophisticated. If the point escapes them and leaves them puzzled it is a sign that this family, at least, would be benefited by a Menckian pontificate, for Henry Mencken is not only a "message of sophistication," but other things as well.—Norfolk Virginian-Pilot.

MAY BE "LAST OF EMPIRES"

Distinction in All Likelihood, Has Been Reserved for the Realm of the Mikado.

The imperial circle, as it might be called, is narrowing. Russia, Germany, Austria, Turkey have all passed into the twilight.

Ordinarily you do not associate the emperor business with King George, because he is the essence of the democratic spirit, and England is to all intents and purposes a crowned republic. Besides, it is not among the impossibilities that self determination will some day pluck the jewel that Reconcord placed upon the diadem of Queen Victoria when he made her empress of India. Japan may be the last of the empires.

So far as it is humanly possible to predict anything in these cataclysmic times, Japan will remain an empire. The zeal for the royal family—it is almost fanaticism—leaves no doubt as to this eventuality. Thus, unlike some of his European colleagues, Prince Hirohito is sure of his succession if he lives. He need never worry about radical intrigue.—Isaac F. Marcossin in the Saturday Evening Post.

OPPOSED CREAM IN COFFEE

Frenchman, a Century Ago, Ascribed All Sorts of Human Ills to the Custom.

Arsene Thiebaud de Berneud, 11-brarian a century ago to the Bibliotheque Mazarin, Paris, opposed with fervor the then comparatively new custom of adding milk or cream to black coffee. The latter, in the author's language, was "consoling, joyful and, I had nearly said, spiritual" in its effects. But let ever so small a quantity of milk or cream be added and the result upon the human economy was most disastrous.

Since the dawn of this vicious custom pneumonia and consumption in the cities had increased one-half and rural communities formerly immune were now beginning to show cases of these ailments.

According to Le Progres Medical, which obtained the above information from a new popular review, La Connaissance, de Berneud claimed that many eminent physicians shared his opinions. He seems to have had an obsession that all mixtures of fluids were injurious, and extended his prescription of milk addition to tea, chocolate and spirits. Sustained by this pre-conceived notion, he was able to publish a long diatribe in 1820, in which he accuses cafe au lait of causing almost every derangement known to medicine. But, rabid as he sounds, he was fatuous enough to admit that perhaps 10 per cent of the people might be tough enough to drink cafe au lait without disastrous results.—New York World.

BUILDING UP BUFFALO HERDS

Department of Agriculture Has Had Gratifying Success With This Part of Its Work.

Forty-six new buffalo calves are reported on three of the four game preserves maintained by the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture for the special protection of buffalo. On the national bison range, in Montana, there are 417 buffalo, including 28 calves born this spring. Fifteen calves are reported at the Wind Cave preserve, in South Dakota, and 3 at Niobrara, Neb.

The department has been very fortunate in maintaining the herds established at these three points and at Sullys Hill, North Dakota. There are relatively few large buffalo herds now scattered over the country, and the biological survey has made special efforts to provide suitable ranges and protection for what threatened a few years ago to become an extinct species of native American animal.

Interesting Powder Horn Map.

A map engraved on an old powder horn may lead to the location of the sites of several Cherokee Indian towns in western North Carolina, according to the Bureau of American Ethnology at Washington.

The powder horn is a loan from David Kirk, Newtonstown, County Down, Ireland, and dates from about 1750 when the English were beginning to open up the Cherokee region. It belonged to James Grant, member of a company of British soldiers stationed near Charleston and near London and Fort Prince George in the Cherokee country about the time that these forts were besieged.

The horn is elaborately engraved with the royal arms of Great Britain and the map showing the ancient town of Ucaessee and other towns in the region in which the soldier saw service.

Perpetual Motion Discredited.

It seems hardly credible, but up to the year 1772, there was no scientist in all Europe who knew enough to categorically deny that there was such a thing as perpetual motion.

It remained for Sir Isaac Newton and the French scientist, De La Hire, to demonstrate beyond doubt the impossibility of attaining it. Quite a little time passed before the scientific world in general was willing to accept the Newtonian theory, but finally the French Academy of Science at Paris, in 1775, publicly declared that perpetual motion was an impossibility and thereby branded all those who still insisted upon experimenting with it as charlatans.—Pittsburgh Leader.

Multiples Scenery.

A Russian widow, Mme. Ivan Boutkovsky, has devised an ingenious scheme for "multiple scenery," whereby two scenes are painted upon one canvas. Colored lights are thrown upon this drop-scene, which bring out certain colors while concealing others, so that with the same stage setting either a landscape or an interior may immediately be brought into view. Playing several acts with one set of scenery is an idea that should appeal strongly to producers, both as a novelty and from an economical point of view.—Scientific American.

Radio in Indo-China.

Indo-China is covered with a complete radio telegraphic system, comprising 15 stations equipped with the best high-powered apparatus. The country receives every night from the Bordeaux station in France full market and financial reports and the news of the day.

Girl's Long Hike.

The Panama canal zone women's walking championship is held by a twelve-year-old girl—Alma Mann—who walked through the canal zone from ocean to ocean, a distance of approximately 50 miles, in 16 hours and 26 minutes.

Where First New Yorker Lived.

Aldrich Court, one of the loveliest Broadway office buildings of the old type, covers the site of the first structure erected by a white man on Manhattan Island. A tablet to this effect is on the present building. At No. 11 Broadway, Capt. Adrain Block built four huts. This settlement preceded the Dutch colonists, who came to establish a trading post in the new world. The present building is the home of the United States shipping board.

To the Land Owners of the Nyssa-Arcadia Drainage District: Having been duly appointed by the Board of Supervisors, as provided by law, to audit the books of the Treasurer and investigate the financial condition of the District, report our findings as follows:

The Budget Committee of the said Nyssa-Arcadia Drainage District comprised of G. G. Lees, Dick Tensen and J. H. Forbes, being the duly elected and qualified Supervisors of said District, and C. C. Hunt, E. B. Butler, Jr., and E. M. Blodgett, being a suitable number of qualified electors and freeholders of said District, met on Sept. 17, 1921, in accordance with law, and compiled a budget aggregating in amount \$11,343.08, using the estimated amount of expenditures for the calendar year 1922; and in accordance therewith the Levying Board duly met October 14, 1921, and levied an assessment of 1 1/2% of the tax levy of \$98,635.48 covering the bond issue, or \$1,134.08. There is still due the District from this and previous levies unpaid taxes in amount of \$9,970.58. We have made a careful audit of the Treasurer's books and find all money's duly and regularly accounted for.
