S.-A. VETERANS AIDED READY FOR BIG CROWD

GOVERNMENT TO CARE FOR RECORD BREAKER EXPECTED
DISABLED SOLDIERS OF NORTHWEST ARMISTICE DAY IDAHO-UTAH GAME

Spanish American war veterans of the Pacific Northwest suffering from tuberculosis or mental and nervous diseases will hereafter be treated in governmental hospitals of this district heretofore occupied exclusively by veterans of the World War. This new move on the part of the government has been announced by L. C. Jessup of Seattle, the Pacific Northwest manager of the United States Veteran's Bureau. Veterans of the Philippine Insurrection and Boxer Rebellion are also effected by the new ruling.

No proof of service connection of the disability is required from any veterans of these conflicts, it was announced. The only requirement is that they have papers showing an honorable discharge from the service. Tuberculosis cases are to be treated at Walla Walla, Wash., and mental or nervous cases are taken care of at Tacoma or Boise. It is believed that many veterans throughout the district affected by the new order will take advantage of the treatments offered.

Announcement was also made by the Veteran's Bureau that four compensation experts will soon be assigned to as many veteran's hospitals of this district with more than 100 patients each for permanent duty to handle claims and grievances of the hospitalized veterans.

Another Veteran's Bureau instruction states that the former service people with dental disabilities of service origin of less than 10 percent who filed claims before August 9 of this year are entitled to free governmental treatment. Dental disabilities of more than 10 percent will be treated if claim is made within five years after discharge, it was stated.

Over \$1,000,000 a year for operation
Over \$3,000,000 for buildings and grounds

THE first cost of state monopoly of schools would be something over three million dollars for new buildings and grounds. We would have to pay a yearly tax of over one million dollars for operation in addition to what we are paying now.

They propose that Oregonians pay this bill for "Real Americanism." But it is not Americanism to take away the right of the parent to control the education of the child.

They propose that we pay this bill to have "Compulsory School." But we actually have compulsory school right now under the present law.
