You Have a Duty

The home newspaper has a duty which it owes to its community and which most editors recognize and observe. The outside world gains a good deal of its impression of a small city from the pages of its news paper. If this paper has plenty of live local news and an appearance of prosperity, the city is judged to be prosperous and wide-awake. It therefore follows that whatever you can do to assist the editor in publishing a credible newspaper is helping to broadcast the news that Vale is a good place to live in. Here are a few suggestions which we urge you to remember and observe:—

Because you know what happens right around you it does not follow that all the country knows the same thing. Therefore send to The Enterprise the news of local events, marriages, sickness, death, accidents, fires, accounts of good crops, public meetings and the hundred and one things you and your neighbors talk about. If you will do this your example will encourage others to do the same and you will soon get the benefits of your own good works.

Do not expect the impossible in perfection. The perfect page has never been printed. And do not, by all means, attribute every typographical error to an evidence of malicious intent to hurt or make fun of some one.

Pay your subscription when due. The date following your name on the label will give you that information. Applying credits to your subscription may be likened to a farmer selling out his crop, a bushel to a man. The sum would seem of little account but the aggregate might make or break the farmer.

If you have a father, mother, brother, sister or a friend at a distance and are able to do so, subscribe, pay for and send them the paper.

Advertise your business in the Enterprise every week even if it is but a few lines.

Farm Pointers

If vetch is to be planted for hay this year, seeding should take place in southern Oregon and in the Willamette valley principally before the first of March. In some of the higher altitudes and in the coast district a little later seeding is permissible but best results are always to be secured with early planting. For March planting, peas and oats are usually better than vetch and oats for hay or green feed purposes.

Folks who want summer pasture for hogs can plant Dwarf Essex rape at about 5 pounds an acre in April, May or early June and have a good hog pasture in six to eight weeks after the seed is planted. The later plantings, if the soil has been prepared early, usually make a good deal of excellent summer hog pasture.

The best spring planted annual legume hay crop or silage crop or green feed crop for the coast region is peas and oats. White Canadian field peas at about 90 pounds an acre with 50 to 60 pounds of oats make a large yield of feed which reaches the hay stage about the middle of the summer. It is good for silage or for hay and may be cut for green feed a long time before it reaches the hay stage. It is important that it be planted early, as in late March or in the month of April. Later plantings do not get very good yields.

STUDENTS MAY COMPETE

PRIZES WILL BE GIVEN FOR ESSAY ON AMERICAN REVOLUTION HISTORY

Mrs. E. M. Crail, county school superintendent, has received an announcement of three prizes which are offered the students of the public schools of Oregon for the best essays on topics connected with the war for American independence. These prizes are offered by the Oregon Branch of the Sons of the American Revolution and total \$50 in cash to be divided into three prizes, \$25, \$15 and \$10. The announcement giving the rules, etc., is as follows:—

"The Oregon Society, Sons of the American Revolution takes pleasure in offering a series of prizes totaling the sum of \$50 to public schools of the state of Oregon for essays on topics connected with the war for American independence. There will be three prizes awarded this year; \$25 for the best, \$15 for the second and \$10 for the third best essay respectively, written by pupils of the grade or high schools of the state on one of the following subjects.

"Our wars of 1776 and 1917, Contrasts and Similarities.

"The Treaty of Versailles and Paris 1783.

"The Naval Warfare of the American Revolution.

"The conditions governing this essay contest are as follows: The essays are limited in length to three thousand words, must be written on one side only of paper and accompanied by a statement from the writer's teacher that the writer is a pupil in a designated class and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work.

"The essay must be signed by the writer and his or her postoffice address (including county) must be given. The essays should be forwarded to Herbert B. Auger, chairman of the committee, 960 Savier street, Portland and should reach their destination not later than April 15, 1923. Essays not complying with the conditions stated above will not be considered.

"In awarding the prizes the committee will be governed by consideration of:

"Originality

"Accuracy of statement

"Manner of treatment

"Orthography, syntax and punctuation.

"Neatness and legibility

"These prizes are offered to encourage love of our country and a study of its history.

"Any additional information which may be desired will be cheerfully furnished by the chairman of the essay committee."
