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Prohibition vs. Temperance.

Editor Journal.—In a recent issue of your valued paper you took occasion to castigate our old friend Mark Bates on his attitude toward the prohibition question. You did a fairly good job but, after all, is Mark so very much astray? In saying that for centuries our legislators have been trying to improve on the Ten Commandments, the Fayette Lake editor may have been a little wide of the mark, but I think I can show to your entire satisfaction that for a long time legislators have been attempting to improve on the teachings of the Scriptures generally. In regard to this question.

From the text of our editorial I gather that you are under the impression that the drinking of wine or other alcoholic beverages is in violation of the Ten Commandments, and Bible teaching generally. Let us see! How many passages of Scripture can you find that forbid the drinking of strong drink? Very few indeed. The fact of the matter is, that throughout all ages God has allowed the moderate use of wine and a strong drink. True, temperance, as opposed to prohibition, which is not temperance at all.

Canaan was greatly praised by God because it was a land of corn and wine. The Israelites who were settled far off from the tabernacle were told to turn their tithes into money and bring that money to the place where the Lord would choose to put His name, and spend it on flesh or wine or strong drink, or anything their soul lusted after, and use up those things before the Lord.

Once two of Aaron's sons got drunk and offered up strange fire. For this they were killed, and yet for all that, the priests were not forbidden to drink wine or strong drink, some of them, it seems, just for a time, but there is no injunction anywhere in the Bible requiring people generally to abstain.

We are told to be temperate in all things. That means to be moderate in all things, not to go to excess in anything.

Christ is our great example. He was not an abstainer. He both used wine himself and gave it to his friends as a pleasant drink, not as a medicine. He also made wine. It is said that the wine he made could not intoxicate. That is not true, for it was good strong wine which it could not be without a good percentage of alcohol in it. John 2:10

Some modern doctors are quoted as saying that alcohol, even in minute quantities, is injurious to the human system. Well, in that opinion they are at variance with God, for he has put alcohol into most of the nice things we eat and drink, and they would not be good without it. And also he has sanctioned the use of wine in all ages, and he never changes his mind about anything, as doctors sometimes do. Those medical gentlemen are also at

variance with the Apostle Paul who, when his friend Timothy was in poor health, advised him to quit drinking water, and instead drink wine. 1 Tim. 5:23.

So you see, Mr. Editor, that the moderate use of wine is quite permissible and our friend Bates has good cause to complain of a law which infringes on his personal liberty to the extent of depriving him of one of God's good gifts to man; and his criticism of the legislators who would improve on the Scriptures is justified by the Scriptures themselves.

In regard to the saloon, we agree fully with you. As an institution it was an intolerable nuisance, a breeder of death and degradation, a disgrace to the community in which it lived and a shame to the government, which for a portion of its ungodly gains gave it legal protection.
